OYSTERS PLANTED MANY YEARS AGO

Interesting Facts of History Are Given About the Early Day Experiments

In referring to the fact that a North Bend boy picked up a live and well developed oyster at South Slough the Coos Bay News gives some interesting facts regarding the early oyster growing in this locality.

This paper says: "In the '80's, the late John Nasburg and J. T. Davis planted a lot of small eastern oysters on the shell and sand bottom at Glasgow, close to where the wreck of the old brig Davens was then lying. Two or three years afterwards some of these oysters were gathered by the aid of tongs fastened to long handles and brought to Marshfield.

In 1881, Ward & Shingle fitted oyster rooms over their saloon on Front street, in the building at present occupied by Tower's jewelry store. They dumped the shells, to which numbers of little oysters called spat were clinging, on a pile of rock ballast discharged from schooners back of a saloon where the tide ebbed and flowed.

In addition to these earlier attempts at oyster planting there has been more recent experiments made on the Bay, as has been mentioned in this paper.
