GENERAL OBJECTION TO TELEPHONE COMPANY'S PLAN

Declare It Imposition on Patrons—Waste for Business Firms in Advertising.

The proposal to make the local telephone directory an advertising pamphlet is causing considerable discussion around town and the general expression is that advertising should be eliminated from it.

"No one wants to have to wade through a Chinese laundry bill when he is in a hurry to get a telephone number," said one man. "It is an imposition on the patrons and it does no one any good except those getting a revenue out of it."

"As to the value of the advertising in it for an advertiser, I cannot see how any one can figure any returns from it. Certainly no one who is looking for a telephone number wastes any time to read ads in it and I never saw anyone reading a telephone directory for diversion or enlightenment."

"It would be about as well to stick an advertisement in the center of one of the big concrete piers in the new Southern Pacific bridge and expect returns from it, as to put an ad in a telephone directory."

The cost of issuing the telephone directories is comparatively small, the last issue costing entire, about \$180. With the advertising eliminated from it, the cost on the same figures would be considerably reduced.

"I was certainly glad to see Mr. Lewis' statement that the Business Men's Association was putting a check to the advertising fakirs. Business men have been subjected to too many donations under the guise of advertising."
