Last season, the company had 2,500 directories printed and the price was something like \$150 for the whole lot.

Fake Solicitor. Last year the telephone company had troubles of its own over the issuance of the directory.

Might Affect Service. Some of those who have been discussing the making an advertising poster out of the telephone directory say that it might lead to a certain embarrassment.

So, parties discussing it claim, that the advertising branch of a phone company might lead to many complications in addition to being an imposition of subscribers by forcing them to wade through a lot of advertising by muling business houses out of considerable cash for space.

Some Unsold Space. Between the issuance of semi-annual directories, the advertising might be kept in practise on the "line of talk" required to get directory advertising by selling exclusive space at the bottom of the telephone poles or on the tips of them.
