Municipal Ownership at Eugene  
Pays City A Handsome Profit

Eugene, Oregon, is preparing to retire \$50,000 of its warrant indebtedness on August 1, and sinking fund accumulations are now sufficient to retire over one-fifth of the city's entire bonded indebtedness. This satisfactory condition of affairs has been brought about through the successful operation of the municipal water plant and power plants which are earning good dividends, although the rate for light and power has been cut almost in half since the municipal plant was installed.

What Eugene is doing Salem or any other municipality may do, but the trouble is that most cities load themselves down with bonds issued for sewers, street improvement and other non-paying property, and let private corporations operate their

light, water and power plants. These corporations without exception install these plants with money raised by the sale of bonds, the interest upon which, along with dividends to stockholders and frequently unnecessary overhead expenses, the patrons of these plants have to pay.

The city could issue bonds to install these public utilities, reduce the price to the consumer, and still take care of the interest on the bonds and provide, as in Eugene, a sinking fund to retire them at maturity. Seattle

Tacoma, San Francisco and several other leading coast cities have adopted a municipal ownership policy with very satisfactory results. Business sense in the conduct of municipal business is not the rarity it once was.

## WANT BRIDGE RAISED

People Say Navigation on Toltcoos Lake Will Be Spoiled

The Florence West says: "A meeting of the residents of Fiddle Creek was held at Ada school house to confer with a representative of the railroad company in regard to the bridge across the arm of Toltcoos Lake below the mouth of Fiddle Creek.

The people there state that the bridge as planned by the railroad company, would be only about four feet above high water and that it would seriously interfere with the navigation of the creek and make it impossible to get through with a raft of logs.

They asked that the bridge be built fifteen feet above high water and that a span forty feet wide be constructed.

The railroad engineer promised to see what could be done for the relief of the people."

## WILL BUILD ROAD

Glenada Plans An Outlet From City to the Railroad.

GLENADA, Ore., May 13.—The Glenada city council has ordered a special election to authorize an issue of \$10,000 bonds. The sum realized from the sale of the bonds is to be used to acquire right of way for and to construct a roadway from the western boundary of Glenada to the railroad. The construction of this road will put Glenada only ten minutes by auto from the depot.

Other road improvements in Glenada are contemplated, one of the most important of these being the building of a road from the center of the town to the lake resort in the south. This will give all tourists coming to this section ready access to all Shuslaw towns, the ocean beach and the lakes just south of Glenada.
