SEEK MONEY DUE

SHERIFF'S OFFICERS SERVES PAPERS ON THREE FIRMS

Bankruptcy Proceeding Dropper by August Hendrickson When Personal Property Not Exempted

Papers were served today from the sheriff's office by Deputy Andrew Davis against three business houses for the settlement of claims, and one of the places was closed.

August Hendrickson and Alex Haquist, who conduct a shoe store on North Front street, have failed to pay \$1493.04 according to the papers filed against them by Arthur McKeown. Interest on the money from April 23 is asked for, together with \$50 attorneys fees. F. W. Bertram has been appointed Sheriff's keeper of the stock.

Bankruptcy proceedings were started some time ago by Hendrickson and the papers sent to Portland when it was claimed that he found he could not exempt his house and lot with other personal property and the action was countermanded by wire.

A garnishment was served for W. L. Buckner on H. Sweeney, plumbing shop proprietor of North Bend, for failure to meet \$339.59 in obligations.

Wladystaw Oldakowski, brother of Luis Kalnowski, victim of the Bunker Hill fire, has filed papers seeking his appointment in the place of Dwight E. Hodge as administrator of his brother's estate.

POWERS VOTES

SCHOOL BONDS (Special to The Times. POWERS, Ore., May 14.—

By a vote of thirty-eight to eleven, the electors of the Powers school district voted to issue \$18,000 bonds to erect a fine school building here. Arrangements will be made at once to market the bonds and it is hoped to have the new building in readiness for the opening of school next fall.

TO MAKE REPORT ON LOWER BAY LEDGE

Port Engineer Charleson Will Submit Report to Port Commissioners Tomorrow

Particulars regarding the ledge of rock in the lower bay below Empire will be made tomorrow by Engineer Donald Charleson at the special meeting of the Port Commissioners. He has just completed his survey.

What action will be taken with the ledge is problematical. It is possible that the War Department will be asked to aid in the removal of the obstructions and it is also possible that only a portion of it may be blown up and the main channel shifted on a wide curve to avoid the ledge.

Reports from Portland show that there too rock has been encountered in the harbor, the ledge of the Linton quarries extending out into the river and stopping the work there of the river dredge.
