That she be permitted to assume the name of Myrtle A. Edwards.

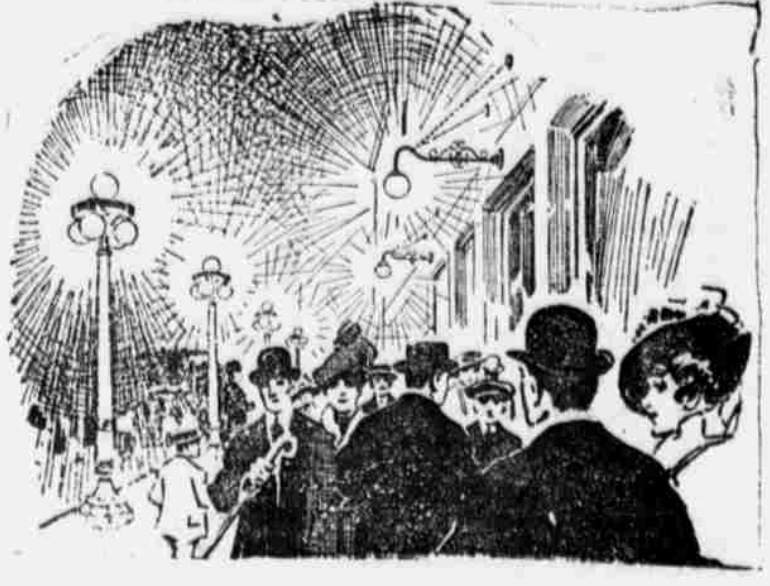

There will be only one mass, at 8 a. m. at North Bend tomorrow, and one only, at 10:30, at Marshfield. Rev. Father Wallace will attend both places.

A PROMINENT MAN

H. A. REDFIELD PASSES AWAY AT BERKELEY HOME. Cousin of A. D. Wolcott of Marshfield Occupied Prominent Place in Musical and Engineering Circles.

The following press dispatch from Berkeley, California, tells of the passing of a man prominent in the musical and engineering circles of that state, who is a cousin of Mr. A. D. Wolcott of this city. The following is taken from the Oakland Tribune. "Horace Allen Redfield, for many years prominent in both musical and engineering circles of California, a graduate of the class of 1876 of the University of California, died in a San Francisco hospital after a short illness.

Redfield was a native of New York State, 59 years old. He was brought to California by his aunt, Mrs. J. Preston Moore, in 1871, and by her was entered at the University in 1872. It was then California College and located at Twelfth and Webster streets in Oakland. On the removal of the college to Berkeley, Redfield followed and paid his way through the institution by working on the construction of North Hall. He graduated with Justice Henry A. Melvin and others, who have since become prominent.

He commenced work with the Southern Pacific company on his graduation and later was identified with John A. Britton in the Oakland Gas Light and Heat company. For many years he was connected with the Music and Dramatic Bureau and was responsible for bringing to the Pacific coast Paderewski and Mme. Bloomfield-Zeisler and other well known musicians. At the time of his death he was outside man for the Sunset Press of San Francisco.

He leaves a wife, Mrs. Thurza Redfield; three daughters, Mrs. Jane and Miss Ruth Redfield, and Mrs. Omer N. Krushke, all of Berkeley, and one son, Lowell Redfield, a well known musician and vocal teacher of the bay cities.

Referring to the above it may be stated that a sister of the deceased, Miss Jennie L. Redfield, a former resident of Napa, and three grandmembers of the family circle. Miss Redfield is State Superintendent of the Co-operation with Missionary societies of the W. C. T. U. of California.
