NEW BLOCK RAISES AT MYRTLE POINT

BIG STRUCTURE FOR RANDON TO START IN MONTH
Will Contain 26 Large Offices and Four Store Rooms—Cost of Building Materials at Lowest

Erection of the big B. B. Block in Bandon, to be one of the most modern structures in the county, has been authorized and actual construction is expected within a month.

The B. B. Block will be situated at the corner of Bandon avenue and First street West. It will have 26 large office rooms and on the lower floor four store rooms, one of which will be fitted up for a pool and billiard parlor.

The owners will be Dr. and Mrs. Biggs, of Tacoma, and Mr. and Mrs. Burkinham, of Monroe, Oregon. Both the women are daughters of Mrs. Fannie E. Dyer, of Bandon.

Bids on the building will be called for in a month. This was authorized by Dr. and Mrs. Biggs who came to Marshfield Saturday to consult with Mr. Ostlund.

When the building was first contemplated last fall bids were submitted, but since that time there has been a great change in the cost of building materials and the low bidder is said to have moved into Eastern Oregon.

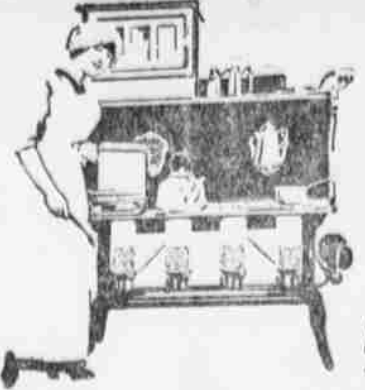
