**Ten Mile Shop.**—Wm. Warren, formerly with the Curry and Blanco barber shops left yesterday for Ten Mile where he will open a barber shop in the Lakeside Hotel.

**Move Engine.**—Henry Hoek has engaged Fred Brown, recently from Gardner, to move the big yarding engine from the Smith Basin camp to the Forbes camp on Isthmus Inlet.

**Parent-Teachers' Club.**—The Bunker Hill Parent-Teachers' Club meets Friday afternoon at 2:15 at the school house. Miss Elizabeth Topping, Marshfield librarian, will be present and address the meeting. All patrons and friends are urged to come.

**Field Meet.**—According to present plans the Coos County High School field meet will be held May 26. The Marshfield, North Bend, Bandon, Coquille and Myrtle Point schools are expected to have ten men in the fourteen events on the program.

**Urge Diking.**—The old project of diking the Southern Oregon lands near the confluence of Catching Inlet and Coos River is being taken up again. T. M. Collier and other Catching Inlet ranchers are urging it as the improvement in addition to reclaiming a fine lot of bottom land for the Southern Oregon company will protect Catching Inlet bottom lands from being inundated by high tides and freshets from Coos River.

**Cut Distances To Empire.**—J. P. Morris has secured more than 150 names to the petition which will be presented at the next meeting of the county court asking them to improve the stretch of road now taken over by them from the old road running westerly to the North Bend-Empire road. This is a distance of about

half a mile. Once improved for traffic it will cut down the distance to Empire.

**Suits Are Filed.**—Deputy Sheriff Andrew P. Davis was over this morning from the county seat serving legal papers. Suit has been filed by S. C. Sanford against W. A. Powers and Effie May Powers, claiming that in 1914 he sold them a North Bend lot for \$1,575 and that only \$222.80 has been paid and further payments are refused. Sanford asks for \$1,462 and interest.

**Wants Separate Maintenance.**—Mrs. Lillie Prewitt, who now lives about six miles below Bandon has filed a suit against her husband David H. Prewitt asking that he give her \$50 a month for separate maintenance and \$150 attorneys fees. The couple are not now living together.

**Thirteen Leave.**—Thirteen left on the Gasco this morning for Gardner and Florence and other northern points.

**School Exhibit.**—Prof. F. A. Tiedgen is sending to the parents of the primary intermediate and grammar departments notices of the annual school exhibition Friday, May 21, from two to 5:30 and 7:30 to 10:30. The departments of manual training will exhibit in the gymnasium; the domestic science and art drawing, on the first floor of the High School. All parents and friends have been invited.

**Rhododendron Carnival Draws.**—Many Coos Bay people are planning on attending the annual Rhododendron Carnival that opens in Florence on Friday. Reports from there are to the effect that the flowers are out in full bloom and that the decorations of this year will be even better than ever. It is possible that an excursion will be run from Eugene on the Willamette Pacific as far as Mapleton and thence down the river on boats.

**Has Shrapnel Bullet.**—Mel G. Duncan has two heavy shrapnel shells that were fired in an Arizona fort during gun practise. They show the manner in which the shells are being used in the European warfare. The outside of the shell is heavy steel. The nose is of steel and the inside is pounded full of lead bullets. These shells can be timed so that they burst over an enemies' trench, scattering a rain of lead in every direction. They have proved one of the most effective means of killing men yet discovered.

**Household Fracas.**—The police were called yesterday afternoon to a rooming house on South Broadway where the landlady, in the act of ousting some tenants claimed that they were also taking her electric light globes. Orders to move were served several days ago by Constable Cox. Lola Baldwin, who conducts the rooming house, sought the help of the constable and failing in this is said to have declared the occupants would leave by the window route. The matter was patched up without any arrests.

**Ferry On Ways.**—The Eastside ferryboat Transit has gone on the ways at the Kruse and Banks ship yard for a week's repairing of the engines and the calking of the hull. The launch Shamrock, Captain W. H. Cavanaugh, has now both the right and the day run. Last month the night service carried 1,628 passengers. It is believed the Transit will be put on July 1 for the night service in addition to her present schedule. The launch at night leaves the foot of Market street at 7:10 p. m. and every hour until 11:15 p. m. It leaves Eastside at 7:15 and every hour thereafter until 11:15 p. m. the last trip.
