### SECURE BOND MONEY

The Siuslaw Port has raised the money needed for harbor improvements in the Port bonds issued according to the following from the Eugene Register:

"The \$100,000 port of Siuslaw bonds have been signed and forwarded by the secretary of the port to the buyers, Sweet, Causey and Foster, of Denver, and the money is expected to arrive in a few days. I. B. Cushman, president, and T. J. Neeley, secretary of the commission, are now in Portland to see the government engineer in regard to continuing the jetty work at the mouth of the Siuslaw River.

As soon as the money is on hand for the work the port will call for bids and it is expected to have the work started by the middle of summer.

It is believed by the members of the commission that the expenditure of this amount of money, together with the amount the government has promised, giving a dollar for every dollar raised by the port, will place the bar at the mouth of the river in such condition that the largest coast vessels may enter the harbor.

The appeal of the recent suit to enjoin the secretary of the commission from issuing the bonds was dismissed in court this week, allowing the commission to go ahead with its plans."

### NORTH BEND CITY FATHERS AUTHORIZE IMPROVEMENT

Virginia Avenue From Pony Slough to City Dock and Portion of McPherson in Project

Grading down of Virginia avenue and McPherson street between Virginia and Vermont avenue was authorized by the North Bend city fathers at their special meeting of last evening. The project will cost approximately \$11,000 as outlined in the ordinance and will probably complete the improvements outlined this summer for North Bend.

That the street may be properly opened to traffic the grading months ago was brought up for the city fathers' opinion. The cost will be assessed evenly against those that have dirt taken from their lots, now high above the street, and those that receive fills on the end near Pony Slough bridge.

June 8 bids for the work will be opened. The work will be completed this summer. The proposal to either plank or pave the street has not yet been brought up for discussion.

### WANT ROAD BUILT

Lane County Refuses Cash Offer of Railroad for Damages

Lane County would rather have a good road between Mapleton and Acme than to accept \$17,500 cash for the destruction of the old road by the building of the grade of the Willamette Pacific between those two towns, according to the Siuslaw Pilot. The cash offer of the railway company, made several months ago, was declined by the county court. The members are of the opinion that the wishes of the people living along the road should be respected. The Siuslaw people are almost unanimous against the acceptance of the cash offer.

At a conference between representatives of the railroad company and the county court the company's cash offer was finally declined and an agreement reached that County Engineer H. W. Libby and the railway company engineers go over the road to ascertain where it is necessary to build it upon the railway right of way and to decide upon other points in connection.

### NORTH BEND WITNESSES DELAYED ON TRIP SOUTH

Chief Anderson and Mrs. Thomas Allen Return From Trial of Counterfeiters at San Francisco

Chief of Police Anderson of North Bend and Mrs. Thomas Allen of that city have returned home from San Francisco where they were called to testify at the trial of Frank Harris and Ed Wilson who were convicted of counterfeiting and who with Claude Allen were arrested on the boat Barnacle which went from this city. Allen pleaded guilty some time ago and the trial of Harris and Wilson resulted in them being found guilty. They were sentenced to one year in jail.

Chief Anderson and Mrs. Thomas Allen, a sister-in-law of one of the accused, were wanted as witnesses to assist in the identification of the men. They did not get to testify however, as they were too late. They got caught this side of a wash-out on the railroad near Sacramento and being delayed, did not reach San Francisco until the day after the trial was completed. If their testimony had been absolutely needed the lawyers would have awaited their arrival but the identification was established anyway.

Chief Anderson says that Ed Wilson's real name is Burch Allen and that he is a brother of Claude Allen. This fact was established by the federal authorities.

### RECALLS INDIAN DAYS

An interesting story is told in connection with the Waters-Davis case just finished in the circuit court in which a half-breed Indian woman claimed to be the daughter and heir of the late J. M. Davis. The story is told in the Coquille Sentinel as follows:

"J. F. Schroeder says that in 1858 one year before his arrival in Coos County, an order went out that the twenty-five or thirty men in this section who were living with Indian women, without having gone through a marriage ceremony, must marry them or give them up. A good many took the latter course and a government boat under Capt. Tichenour gathered up all the abandoned squaws, took them to the Umpqua and placed them on the Siletz reservation.
