CLAREMONT IS A TOTAL LOSS

Guard crew in the small boat standing by they were ready to assist should anything go wrong.

Crew Not Worried.

Because a bottle came ashore with a note asking if there was a life saving crew ashore and because the people of the Claremont were not removed immediately, there was some criticism of the life-savers, but Capt. Britt states that he acted as he believed best and knowing that he could get the people off at any time wanted it possible to save the vessel.

Members of the crew of the Claremont state that they did not believe at any time that they were in serious danger and had every confidence that they would get off all right.

Waited for Flood Tide.

Capt. Reed, of the bar dredge Michie, makes about the same statement as Capt. Britt. He says that soon after the Claremont struck he went down to see what could be done, but it was an ebb tide and he found that he could not do anything until the tide changed. Awaiting the flood tide he anchored in the lower bay. In the meantime the attempt to shoot lines from the Breakwater were made and the F. A. Kilbarn had also gone out.

After they returned Capt. Reed says that Capt. Britt came aboard the dredge and the breeches buoy was operated from the Michie. Capt. Reed says that it took one hour and a half to take all the people off the Claremont.

Twenty-six Aboard

Capt. Benson states that aboard the Claremont there were, besides himself, 24 men in the crew and the one lady passenger, making 25 all told. One man swam ashore making 26 to remove from the vessel.
