### AT HEAD OF LIST IN AMOUNT OF LUMBER SHIPPED

During First Half of May Sent More to San Francisco Bay Than Any Other Port.

During the first half of May Coos Bay shipped more lumber to San Francisco Bay than any other port on the Pacific Coast, though Aberdeen this time was a close second. Each month Coos Bay almost invariably leads the other ports in the lumber taken into the California harbor. The Pioneer Western Lumberman gives the following figures for the first half of May:

### SMITH COMPANY SHOWS PORT ORFORD VARIETY AT FAIR

Splendid Display Made at Agricultural Palace of Exposition Illustrating All Its Uses

Port Orford White Cedar, a product found in quantities only in southern Coos and northern Curry counties, is being splendidly exploited by the C. A. Smith company at the San Francisco exposition. Regarding this display the following interesting account is given in the Pioneer Western Lumberman.

Port Orford cedar is one of the important products of the C. A. Smith Lumber Company. While this lumber has been used on the Pacific Coast for boat building and many other purposes for the past fifty years, the species is not generally known either to the distributor or the consumer.

For this reason the company has made a comprehensive and interesting display of the wood and its uses, which is located in Section 40 in the Agriculture Palace at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition.

The most unique feature of the exhibit is a Port Orford cedar log, cut from a tree that was blown down and lay in the forest for forty years, which is perfectly sound after that long period of exposure to the elements under adverse conditions.

The wood is of a tough, resilient nature, making it particularly adaptable for boat-building and heading purposes; the same quality enables it to withstand the hard usage of encountering on depot platforms, warehouse floors and bridge decking.

Illustrations are given showing its suitability for window frame construction, interior finish and furniture, also the facility with which it retains paints and various styles of finishing.

The wood is of such a close grain, free from pitch, that it may be utilized for printing purposes, taking impressions as clear and free from blurring as printing done on coated book paper.

Another feature is plaster board, made from Port Orford cedar wood pulp, which does not require waterproofing, does not stain, nor does it split in nailing.

The wood has a pungent odor repugnant to moths, and a wardrobe, cedar lined, is part of the display.

The company's mills at Marshfield Oregon, have a capacity of two hundred million feet per annum; most of their cut of Douglas fir, but there is constantly increasing demand for Port Orford Cedar, which they are preparing to supply in any quantity desired.

The exhibit is embellished with the views of the mills at Marshfield, the distributing yards at Bay Point and Oakland, California; also of the company's fleet of large, steam lumber carriers, the latter having a total capacity of four million two hundred and fifty thousand feet. The display is interesting and in-
