Show Old Log The most unique feature of the exhibit is a Port Orford cedar log, cut from a tree that was blown down lay in the forest for forty years, which is perfectly sound after that long period of exposure to the elements under adverse conditions.

The wood is of a tough, resilient nature, making it particularly adaptable for boat-building and bending purposes; the same quality enables it to withstand the hard usage of encountering on depot platforms, warehouse floors and bridge deckencountering on depot

Illustrations are given showing its suitability for window frame con-struction, interior finish and furniture, also the facility with which it retains paints and various styles of finishing.
