MAY DIVIDE STEAM INSPECTION DISTRICT

Plan to Unite Oregon, Washington and Alaska in One With California Separate

Plans are on foot for the division of the steamboat inspection district of the coast into two districts with a supervising inspector over each one. This will be brought up in a bill to be introduced at the next session of Congress. The plea is that the work in the district is too much for one supervisor.

Captain J. K. Bulger, of San Francisco, now has charge of the coast including Coos Bay. He is in authority over Captains Edwards and Fuller and at the present time is investigating the appeals of the Coquille river boatmen.

Should the new plan carry California would become a separate district with Oregon, Washington and Alaska in a second.

Fires Three Times.

Gilbert raised the gun and fired point blank at his wife. The gun gled in the closed room. The next two bullets failed to explode and when the husband drew back to fix his gun she ran out of the room. A third builet plowed its way through her clothes.

Gilbert followed and at the gate stopped and sent a bullet crashing through his brain. He died in-

Coroner Fred Wilson went at once in the Kid and brought back the body. Gilbert was 36 years of age and is said to have been raised in Michigan. He has a brother John Gilbert in Idaho and another whose whereabouts are not known.
