### Lawn and Garden Sprinkling

Everyone who expects to use water for lawn or garden sprinkling is required to sign an application and make payment before using any water for this purpose. The rate fixed by the Railroad Commission for sprinkling is \$1.00 per month for each 5000 square feet (50 by 100-foot lot, or less, building space included). Payment of four months, or \$4.00 in advance allows use for one year in advance for lawn sprinkling, washing windows, porches, etc., but if paid by the month use is only allowed during the month. The rules filed with the Railroad Commission require that payment be made in advance each month before using same and that sprinkling be done only between 6 and 8 o'clock, morning and evening. No reduction in rates will be allowed in case water is not required for sprinkling every day of the month. If water is used for sprinkling without payment having been made in advance or outside of sprinkling hours, the service may be entirely shut off and not turned on until \$1.00 penalty has been paid, month paid.

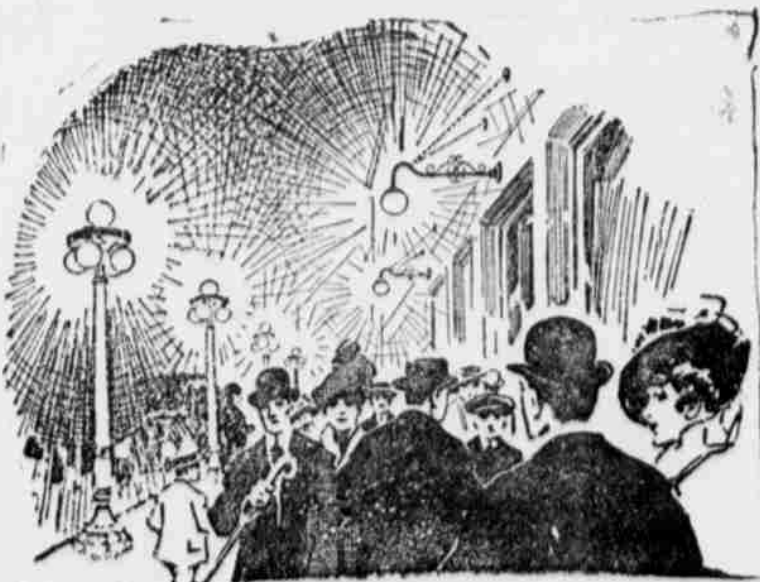

### WILL LEAVE PULPIT

### TO HONOR SOLDIERS

DECORATION DAY BOWS NATION'S HEAD IN HOMAGE

Services of the Day in Masonic Hall Tomorrow Following Parade of the Old Veterans

The little remnant of the Baker Post No. 8, Grand Army of the Republic, veterans of the War of the Rebellion now 50 years ago, will go tomorrow with many friends to the I. O. O. F. cemetery, paying honor to the dead heroes buried there who have gone before. The Nation will bow down its head as a homage to the brave boys of '61 who gave their lives that the United States might live.

There are left 15 members of Baker Post. Some of them are now quite feeble, others are still in active business. All will gather tomorrow to lead the parade to the Masonic Hall where the address of the day is to be given by Dr. H. M. Shaw.

There will be the G. A. R. veterans, the Spanish War veterans, the Sons of Veterans, the Coos Bay Concert Band and several separate bodies.

The parade will lead up Central Avenue to the Masonic Hall. Following the services there it will form again and march to the I. O. O. F. cemetery where the Spanish War Veterans will unveil the monument, the three-inch cannon "in honor of our soldier dead."

Major C. B. Zeek, of Bandon, Past Commander of the G. A. R. in the Department of Oregon, will receive the monument from Frank G. Horton, who will deliver a brief address.

In the concrete base of the monument will be placed a little copper box containing a greeting from Mayor Allen telling of the present condition of Marshfield, the names of the old soldiers, the Spanish War Veterans and the Sons of Veterans.

#### To Decorate Graves.

Early tomorrow morning there will be a stream of carriages and pedestrians bound for the cemetery, decorating the graves of the dead before the services. The sun of the last two days has done much toward bringing out the flowers for the occasion and the prophesy is that there will be heaps of floral offerings for the dead heroes.
