HONOR THE DEAD NEW CAMP FORMED

HUNDREDS GATHER TO PAY MEMORIAL DAY HOMAGE

G. A. R. March in Parade—Every Grave in Cemetery is Well Decorated and Cannon is Received

"Comrades, salute the flag." Old veterans, the boys of '61, bared their heads and stood for a moment in silence, mute recognition of the flag for which they so valiantly fought half a century ago on battlefields below the Mason and Dixon line.

Behind the old veterans of Baker Post were gathered the Spanish American War Veterans, the Sons of Veterans, the lodge of Eagles and every member of the populace that could crowd inside the doors of the Orpheum Theater yesterday afternoon.

At their head rode S. B. Cathcart, the marshal of the day. Behind the veterans came the veterans of the Spanish-American war and lastly, the newly formed Sons of Veterans. They filed into the building and to their seats. The band played patriotic airs. Everyone arose and stood in silence at the rendition of 'The Star Spangled Banner.'

Lincoln's speech to the soldiers as they gathered in Washington at the close of the Civil War was delivered again by Murlin Chapelle, and Dr. H. M. Shaw was introduced as the speaker of the day. His address dwelt on the meaning of Decoration Day and the spirit that has come down to us as a nation as the result of the battle efforts of the boys of '61.

Every Grave Decorated. About the little spot in the cemetery there gathered a host of people. Not a grave in the entire area was left neglected. On some the flowers had been distributed in profusion.

On behalf of the Odd Fellows Judge Hall presented to the G. A. R. the lot upon which the cannon is placed, Commander Miller replying, Frank G. Horton spoke for the Sons of Veterans at the unveiling of the monument. The monument was presented to the Sons of Veterans to give to the G. A. R.

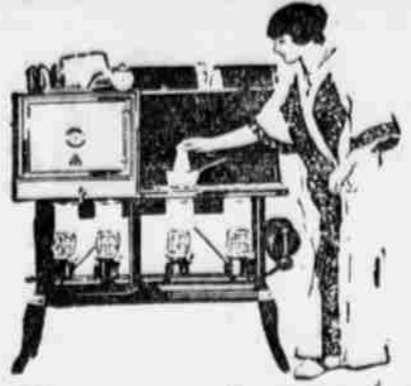

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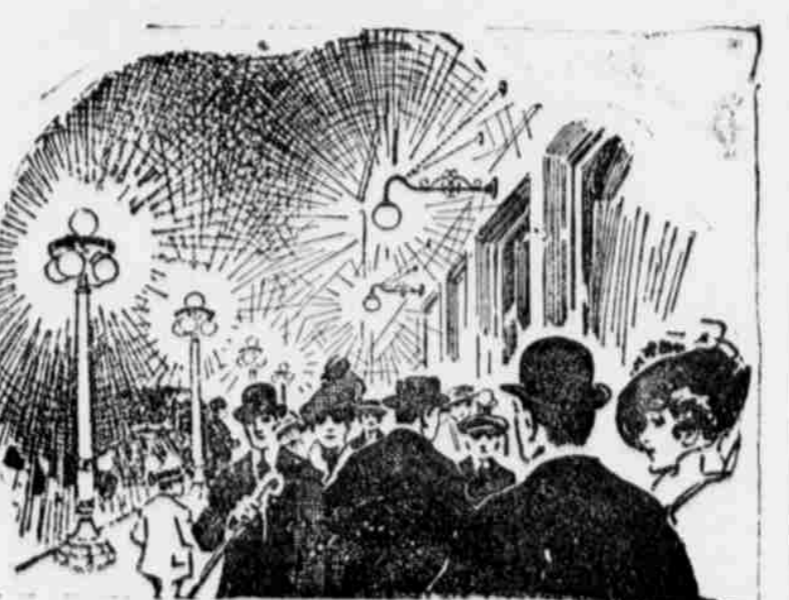
