father, M. E. Thurston, is one of the old employees of the company.

Back to Camp.—A number of the Blue Ridge Tigers are returning here preparatory to the reopening of the McDonald & Vaughn camp at Daniels Creek. Hill brothers, who have been near Portland, have returned. R. E. Sanderson and Geo. Snyder expect to leave today or tomorrow for there and it is expected that most of them will be back.

School Will Close.—The Bunker Hill school will close Friday and a fine program is being arranged for Friday night. The examinations will be held Thursday and Friday. J. E. Drillette, the efficient principal, will close his services with the school and will go to California next week where he expects to engage in the insurance business.

Wife Very Ill.—Mrs. M. J. Ostrow, has received word that Mrs. Jake Goldie, a former well-known Marshfield woman, is lying at the point of death in a hospital at Portland. No Council Tonight.—There will be no meeting of the City fathers this evening by reason of the fact this is a legal holiday. They will gather in the Council chambers tomorrow evening for their first meeting in two weeks when there are several matters of importance up for their attention, one of them being the explanation of the paid firemen situation that has been causing no little discussion among the firemen.
