Crushed by Log.—Fox Cox, of Camp One, who was here yesterday, said that Iso Groatanic, known as "Joe," was crushed by a log. Joe was a buckler and went out in the morning to work. He was alone and the log he was bucking was on a steep hill side and it rolled over and caught him, crushing him to death instantly. The accident must have happened within an hour or so after he started work. The men in camp were unaware of it until evening when Joe failed to return. Search was instituted and his dead body found.

Protest Scrip Plan.—Many hotel men over the state are reported to be protesting the scheme of a California "scrip" company whose purpose it is to sell the scrip which will be received at hotels in lieu of cash. In turn this scrip will be so arranged for that it can be cashed at the banks but only at a 10 per cent discount. The feature of the scrip, according to its originators, is to sell it to a chain of hotels so that traveling men and others will have to stop at the place named on their scrip purchase tickets.

New Record Set.—The police say that a new record for the present jail has been established. An entire week passed peacefully without a single arrest until yesterday when two guests were found in the morning occupying front rooms in the Carter hotel. There has been a gradual falling in the number of drunks in jail. Last fall the average was about two a day; through the winter about one a day and this spring it has been about one every other day. The police say they can't figure out the reason either.

Rid Indebtedness.—Howard Sweeney, of North Bend will come before the local bankruptcy court on June 2 with debts of \$19,000 against him and assets of \$250 in household goods which he affirms are not his. He has been in business in Seattle, Portland and lately in Eugene before coming here a short time ago. He is a plumber by trade. The large debts are Scandinavian-American Bank of Seattle, \$14,000; Crane and Co. Seattle, \$15,000; A. F. Nichols, Seattle, \$6,000; Maryland Casualty Co., Seattle, \$10,000; Portland Trust Co., \$1,500; Samuel Kahn, Stockton, \$400 and W. L. Buckner, Portland, \$500.

Boats Better.—Taylor Sigla who was in from Astoria Inlet today reports that the roads are drying up rapidly and that they will be in fairly good condition for auto travel by Friday if the weather continues fair.

Powers Skating Rink.—Arthur Hart and Fred J. Singer, two young men recently from Michigan, are starting a big skating rink at Powers. The rink will be larger than the Marshfield rink and they have arranged with L. L. Thomas for musical instruments for it.

Boat Drifted Away.—A scow belonging to S. F. Bock drifted from its moorings yesterday. The scow had been tied to a piling near the Smith mill and when the tide went out it carried scow, piling and all. Later the owner found the boat a little farther down stream.

Seek Fourth Finances.—The celebration committee of the Chamber of Commerce is out in full force today in an effort to raise funds for the Fourth of July. The members are G. H. Rotnor, A. J. Mendel and R. M. Jennings. Before they finish and before they decide definitely whether or not Marshfield will have a celebration they expect to see every merchant in the city.

Hearing Postponed.—The hearing of Alfred Baynes, charged by Deputy Game Warden Thomas with having elk horns unlawfully in his possession, was postponed until late this afternoon that the proper witnesses might be secured. For the state James Thomas, Noah Neede and Alton Lary are to appear as witnesses. C. F. McKnight is appearing for the defendant.

Would Receive Pien.—District Attorney Lilleqvist was called to the long distance phone this afternoon by Justice of the Peace Dodge, in Myrtle Point, asking whether or not he could receive the plea of guilty made by a man against whom no warrant had yet been issued. The judge was told that it couldn't be done.

Boat Is Taken.—E. A. Stonecypher of Eastside is again the victim of inactivity. A few months ago, he found a rowboat afloat. He towed it home and advertised it. A few days

later someone came to his dock and took the boat without even saying "Thank You." Two weeks ago he found another rowboat afloat and towed it home. If their identity can be ascertained, it may go hard with them as they cut the chain in order to release the boat from its moorings.

ANOTHER CARLOAD OF FORDS HERE

SHIPMENT OF POPULAR AUTOS FOR Bandon AND CURRY COUNTY—MAKES 28 RECEIVED HERE ALREADY THIS SPRING—BUYERS SHOULD PLACE ORDERS NOW TO INSURE EARLY DELIVERY.

Another carload of the popular Fords arrived here on the Santa Clara yesterday for distribution to Ford purchasers in this territory. This shipment makes a total of 28 new Fords that have arrived here already this spring.

These cars will be driven over the roads to Bandon for distribution in Southern Coos and Curry County, as soon as the roads dry up. Mr. S. G. Whitsett is the hustling sub-agent for the Fords in Bandon and northern Curry County which are part of the territory of Isaac R. Tower, general distributor of the Fords in Southwestern Oregon.

Mr. Whitsett reports that a number of Ford cars are being sold in Curry County this year as the ranchers in that section have discovered that the Ford is the car best suited to the sandy roads and hills. The Ford being light and powerful, is able to negotiate these roads when they are impassable for heavy cars.

Although the Ford Motor Company is still fifty thousand cars behind on deliveries and the shortage has been keenly felt in many parts of the country, it has not been so noticeable here on account of the unusual weather conditions preventing general auto traffic on country roads. The demand for Fords is now getting very brisk and Mr. Tower advises intending Ford purchasers to place their orders at once to avoid the possibility of disappointment of deliveries.
