AID FOR THE UNEMPLOYED

UTILIZATION of the schoolhouses of the country as employment offices for those out of work has been taken under consideration by the United States Bureau of Education, which has approved any movement that will make the schoolhouses more general in their sphere of usefulness.

SMITH COMPANY FOLLOWING PLAN TO ADVERTISE WOOD

Every Piece of Lumber of the Variety Will Bear a Distinctive Trade Mark.

The use of a brand to designate lumber has been adopted by E. W. Wheelock, manager of the C. A. Smith Lumber Company in distributing the Port Orford white cedar. The brand is a design bearing the words "Good Luck Brand, Port Orford Cedar, C. A. Smith Lumber Co."

"I made up my mind if it were found advisable for manufacturers of various articles to place a trade mark on their products to identify them, why not lumber. It is not altogether an innovation. Foreign, and some American dealers, have made it a practice to brand their lumber for export. In the rail trade it was a new idea. We manufacture a high grade of white cedar, known locally as Port Orford cedar. It grows practically in only one section of the world—Coos and Curry counties, Oregon. It is a wood of great value and commanding importance. It is almost immune from decay, comparatively soft and takes paint and enamel beautifully. The supply is limited, its uses unlimited. As large manufacturers who are spending money to introduce it, I felt we should stand behind each piece. Customers who once bought our product could always depend upon getting the same grade.

All Use Trade Marks. "Recently the manager of a large line concern with 40 to 50 yards called on us. He stated that for many years his concern had steadily refused to handle substitutes building materials, and he found their business dwindling and the profits disappearing. He called the heads of the various yards together and considered the advisability of carrying substitutes. At the end of a comparatively short time he found that 62 per cent of the building materials that were being sold were other than lumber and that the profits of the substitutes were carrying the lumber end of the business. Every substitute bore a trade mark.

"We have found but little opposition from our customers in selling trade-marked lumber. We take the position that a manufacturer who is willing to identify his product stands as a guarantor of good faith to the dealer and the consumer that the article is up to grade.

Distribute Samples "We have distributed numerous samples of white cedar and advertise on the sample that this wood has been adopted by the United States Army Department for pontoons; U. S. Navy Department for boards; various cities for wharf and construction uses; ship building companies for ship and joister use; railroads for ties, crossing planks and culverts; mining companies for timbering in wet ground; architects for moth-proof closets, interior finish, etc.; factories for cutting up purposes of all kinds. We are enjoying an excellent and satisfactory trade in white cedar and would be pleased if our business were confined to this class of material."

COOS AND CURRY HENS MAKE ABOUT SAME RECORDS Hens in this part of the state seem to be making some remarkable records. A. Richard, of Port Orford, has a Leghorn hen which laid an egg eight inches in circumference one way and 6 1-4 inches the other way. One of the strong points of this hen is that she not only laid the one big egg but in ten days laid half a dozen of the same size. But Bandon hens go the Curry County biddie one better. L. F. Stevens of that city claims the champion Plymouth Rock hen of the state. The hen recently laid an egg measuring eight inches in circumference one way and six and three-fourths inches the other way. The hen is a consistent layer and Mr. Stevens is looking for her to establish a new laying record for Plymouths.
