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ATHLETES IN TRIM

COME TOMORROW FROM ALL OVER COOS COUNTY FOR MEET

Bandon Is Bringing 24 Men; Myrtle Point and Coquille To Be Represented on Race Track

Track athletes from all over the county are expected here tomorrow for one of the largest inter-high school meets ever held in this city.

Bad weather interfered with the first date set for the meet but so anxious were the schools to participate that a second date was selected.

Last year the Marshfield High School team won the county championship. There will be four schools in the meet tomorrow afternoon and the general belief is that the scores will be exceedingly close.

The entries received from Myrtle Point are Larry Miller, Roy Spires, Arthur Widby, Elton Spires, Chester Root, Chester Adams, John Hall and Harry M. Miller. They will probably be accompanied by Principal L. W. Wimberly.

"We're coming in full force" writes Coach H. W. Quigley of Bandon and he sends an entrance list of 14 men. They are, for the sprints, Rayner Geisendorfer, Raymond Webb, Merton Lowry and Kenon Smith.

In the quarter mile will be Edward Bell, R. Geisendorfer, K. Smith, R. Wedd and in the half mile event, George Stoltz and Bullard; in the mile, Floyd Wilson and Bullard.

There are two entered in the shot put, Sam Armstrong and K. Smith; in the discus, Lloyd Hess and in the javelin, Ivan Pullen and S. Armstrong; in the broad and high jump, K. Smith, R. Webb, and S. Armstrong; K. Smith in the hurdles and Pullen, Claire Shumate and Carl Stephenson in the pole vault and in the relay, Webb, Lowry, Smith, Geisendorfer and Bell.

The entries for Marshfield are, for the 100 yard run, Merchant, Seaman, and Bolt; in the 220 yard dash, Merchant, Seaman and Bolt; in the 440, Seaman, Watkins and Leococq; McDonald, Back, Chapman and Leococq are entered for the half mile and for the pole vault, Watters, Watkins and Chapman. Back, Merchant and Davis will be in the mile and Merchant, Frantz, Leococq and Seaman in the high jump, with Merchant, Seaman and Leococq in the shot put, Graham, Merchant, Leococq and Watters will try the javelin and in the relay will probably be Merchant, Watkins, Seaman and Leococq.

DEFECTS OF BILL

MARINE MEN SAY NEW SEAMAN'S LAW HAS FAULTS

Point Out It May Banish American Passenger Boats From Pacific Ocean

Putting into effect the new seaman's bill will kill practically all service of the Pacific mail liners now engaged in the trans-Pacific trade, say the marine experts on the coast.

When the law becomes effective it is held that it will become necessary to supply the Chinese sailors on the Pacific mail liners. The law does not permit of the employment of Oriental officers.

The wage scale of the Pacific mail liners at present is about \$345,387 annually. Under the new law the wages, it is claimed, will be about \$72,152, a direct increase of \$19,771.
