Saves One Donkey.—One of the four donkey engines aboard the wrecked Claremont has been saved according to Julius Larson. During a brief spell of calm on the bar the engine was removed. It is in good condition and in no way broken, he said. He believes there is little chance of saving the other three engines because of the rough water now on the bar.

Rev. Rutledge At Lebanon.—Rev. H. I. Rutledge, former pastor of the Methodist church here, having left with Mrs. Rutledge two years ago because of ill health, is again in the ministry and has taken the pastorate at Lebanon, according to a letter here to friends. The proceeds of the dances are put in a fund with which it is planned to purchase a fire alarm system for the city.
