SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, in and for Coos County, Myrtle A. Edwards-Roberts, Plaintiff, vs. James Edwards-Roberts, Defendant.

To James Edwards-Roberts, the above named defendant.

In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you herein within ten days from the date of the service of this summons upon you if served within this county, or, if served within any other county of this state, then within twenty days from the date of such service, but, if served by publication, or by personal service outside the state of Oregon, you shall appear and answer on or before the last day of the time prescribed in the order for publication hereof, to-wit, June 6th, 1915.

If you fail to appear and answer said complaint as above required, the plaintiff will take judgment against you for want thereof and will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in her complaint, a succinct statement of which is:

That she be granted a decree of divorce from you;

That she be awarded the care, custody and control of the minor child of plaintiff and defendant, viz, Mary Olive Edwards-Roberts;

That she be permitted to assume the name of Myrtle A. Edwards.
