MOOSE HONORED

COOS COUNTY MEMBERS APPRECIATE COURTESY SHOWN

Every Detail Has Been Arranged for Visit of the Order to San Francisco on Moose Day

The statement published in The Times Saturday that the Coos County Moose would be at the head of the big parade of 30,000 members of the order with the Coos Bay Concert band at the San Francisco Exposition was an announcement which created great interest among the local members.

A detachment of the U. S. Cavalry will act as escort of the Coos county lodge that with the Coos Bay Concert band will head the parade as escort to the officers of the supreme lodge, the Governor of California, the mayor of San Francisco and other prominent men who will be guests of the order.

Will Give Luncheon

The parade will form at the Moose lodge headquarters on Van Ness Avenue and will march to the California building at the Exposition where exercises will be held, immediately after the ceremonies the officials of the Oregon building will give a luncheon to the Coos county lodge officers, the supreme lodge officers, the guests of honor and the members of the band.

Admitted Free

On Moose Day, July 25, the day on which the big Moose parade will take place, all members of the order and their families will be admitted to the exposition grounds free of charge and the members of the band will be admitted free without charge during their entire stay in San Francisco.

The band will doubtless be a drawing card for the Oregon building. Each afternoon for five days preceding Moose Day the band will give a concert on the veranda of the Oregon building.

Hotel Rates

The arrangements for the Moose when they visit the San Francisco exposition are complete down to every detail. Dr. Straw who has just returned home after looking after the plans states that hotel accommodations have been provided for at one of the first class hotels. A special rate has been arranged for the Moose, which will be as follows: Front room, with bath one person \$2 a day, two persons \$2.50 a day, without bath one person \$1.50 a day, two persons \$2 a day.

These rates can be depended upon by the local members of the Moose and can be secured at the hotel where they were arranged.
