Averts Runaway.—Harold Martin driver of a delivery wagon, climbed into the rear end of his wagon and grabbed the line today at noon in time to avert a runaway of his mules down Central Avenue. The animals has already gained a good start when he caught them. They were stopped without difficulty.

Killed Deer.—Deputy Game Warden Thomas went to Myrtle Point yesterday to prosecute Ed Dolan and Walter Rehfeld, two Marshfield young men whom he charges with killing a deer near Powers, where they are employed. Mr. Thomas said that he expected them to plead guilty before Justice Dodge.

Mr. Cope is manager of the cheese factory at Langlois and with his brother, conducts a fine dairy farm near that place. The ranch is known as the Cope brothers' place. Lloyd Hotel Danger.—Inspector Tribbey states that yesterday a piece of the cornice of the Lloyd Hotel blew off and almost struck some pedestrians on Front street.
