## BRITISH REPULSED

### TURKS CLAIM TO HAVE KILLED MANY IN BATTLE

Travelers Report That There Are Forty Thousand Wounded English at Alexandria Egypt

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)  
BERLIN, June 9.—(Wireless to Sayville, L. I.)—A telegram from Constantinople evidently referring to the engagement of Sunday says: "The Turks repulsed British attacks at Suddul Bahr. Thousands of dead Englishmen covered the field. The Turks captured 17 machine guns as well as rifles and other war material. They also took some prisoners. The position of the British troops is dangerous. They are without the support of the heavy guns of their ships. Travelers report that at Alexandria, Egypt, there are no fewer than 40,000 wounded British soldiers.

### PETROLEUM IS SCARCE

Report That It Cannot Be Bought at All in the Shops of Berlin.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)  
BERLIN, June 9.—A great scarcity of petroleum prevails in Berlin. According to some reports it cannot be bought in the shops at all. Notwithstanding the scarcity, however, the price has been held uniformly at 22 pfennigs per litre since the war began; but there is now a movement on foot to raise it to 30 pfennigs. It is explained that the German branch of the Standard Oil Company purposely kept down the price so that petroleum might not be displaced during the war by gas or electricity.

### SAYS POLITICIANS FAIL TO DISTINGUISH

Miss Blackwell Complains that Resentment is Visited on the Suffrage Movement Generally

CHICAGO, Ill., June 9.—Miss Alice Stone Blackwell of New York, addressing the mid-year conference of the National Woman Suffrage Association here today, said the association suffers from the militant actions of Congressional Union for the reason that politicians do not distinguish between one association and another but visit their resentment on the suffrage movement generally.

### SMALL STATE HAS DECLARED NEUTRALITY

Swiss Government Will Allow Transit of Wheat for the Principality of Lichtenstein

ZURICH, Switzerland, June 9.—The principality of Lichtenstein, nominally a sovereign state, but in reality connected by treaties, customs union and telegraphic and postal communications with Austria-Hungary, has declared neutrality in the war. Consequently the Swiss government, with the consent of France, is allowing the transit for Lichtenstein of wheat entering French ports.

Permit me to introduce myself to the public generally. Modest and retiring both by nature and occupation, I have hitherto refrained from striding myself upon the attention of the multitude.

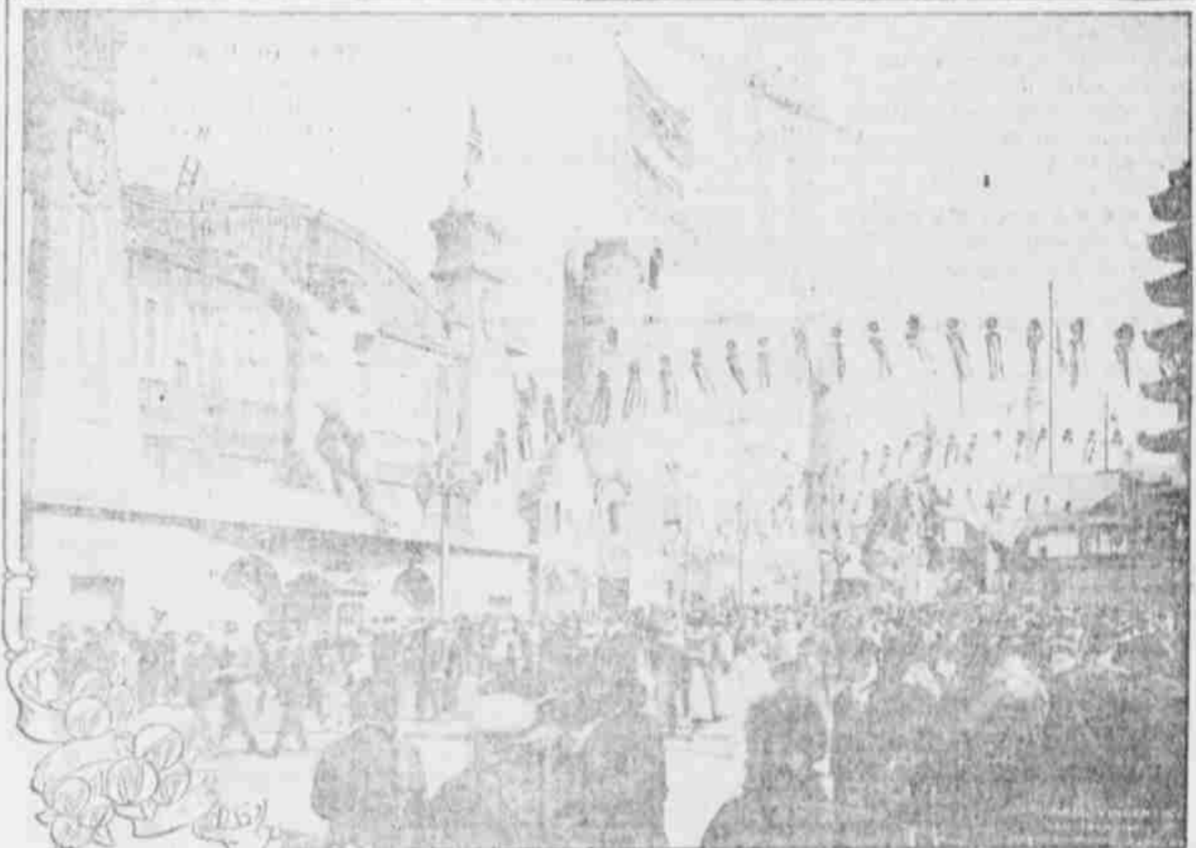

**Fires in the Philippines.**  
The fighting of fires in the dry season is a grave problem in the cities and pueblos of the Philippine Islands. House construction is light, the roofs being made from nipa palm leaves, the framework of bamboo and the sides of either nipa or sawal—a woven product of certain species of bamboo. This material has been exposed continuously to the sun for several months it becomes as inflammable as tinder. Fires that break out in the nipa districts always gain great headway before any kind of an alarm can be sent in even where there is a fire department. Fires in such districts spread with great rapidity. In thickly populated areas it is not uncommon for a fire to burn several hundred houses before it is stopped.

**Keep the Hands Clean.**  
Clean hands and nails are most important precautions against carrying poisonous germs into the mouth on food taken in the hands. Nurses attending cases of typhoid have not infrequently taken the disease because of such failure to cleanse their hands before eating. A towel may carry germs from one person who has been infected into the eyes of another who uses it and is rendered blind.

### EAR DRUMS AND DROWNING.

Why Good Swimmers May Meet Sudden Death in the Water.

Sudden death of swimmers has never been explained satisfactorily, but it is generally assumed that it is due to cramps that affect the respiratory muscles. The Medical Record says there is another theory that "has never received the attention which it merits." This is that cold water penetrating the ear sets up an irritation in the delicate membrane of the inner ear. It cites an address delivered by Dr. Guethel before the Berlin Physiological Society, in which he revived this theory.

The irritation of the labyrinth of the inner ear by cold water causes sudden paralysis, just as a shock to it through a sharp blow on the side will cause a "pin-point." The symptoms of the swimmer and the fighter are identical. They can make motions, but cannot direct them; they may become temporarily unconscious. In the case of the swimmer, of course, drowning follows unless some one helps him.

The Medical Record says that persons with perforated ear drums are those chiefly menaced by this accident, although it may occur to others. And this in spite of the fact that children with large perforations of the ear drum often swim and dive with impunity.

### HEALTH GIVING OZONE.

Its Process of Formation and the Way It Attacks Microbes.

The pungent, bracing effect of mountain air is largely due to the presence of great quantities of ozone. Every one knows this and learnedly talks about the ozone in the air, but very few people have the slightest idea of what they are really talking about.

Nature makes ozone by allowing the ultra violet rays of the sun to act upon the oxygen of the air. Briefly, ozone is a particularly active form of oxygen. A molecule of oxygen is composed of two atoms, whereas ozone is composed of three.

As only two elements of oxygen can exist together, the addition of the third sets up a disturbance, which causes it to detach itself from the other two. Being thus detached, the third atom, which is now ozone, wanders around by itself, gravitates with great sureness and rapidity to any bit of foul air or any molecule which may be lurking in the vicinity, for the attraction between ozone and microbes is irresistible.

Like most fatal poisons, the outcome is tragic, for the ozone burns up the microbes as soon as they touch each other. This is the reason that ozone is health giving; it may be truly said to eat up disease.—Detroit Free Press.

**Cunning at the Fox.**  
A fox on emergency will chain death to perfection. A number of hounds once named a fox in a whip as he loped before him. The fox appeared to have been strangled. When held up by the scruff of the neck his eyes were seen to be closed, his jaws gaped and the body hung limply down from the hind. He was pinned tenderly on the ground only to dash off to covert.—London Standard.
