LAUNCH PROJECT FIND LONG SHORT BRING NEW MOOSE

LOCAL CHAMBER HAS NOVEL SUGGESTION FOR COAST

Asks Launching at Big Good Roads Meeting in San Francisco of Military Highway Project

Launching of the Military Highway movement at the meeting of the Tri-State Good Roads Association in San Francisco when hundreds of delegates will be present has been proposed by the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce in three states asking their endorsement and encouragement.

Excitation for a coast road to extend between Puget Sound, through Coos Bay and down to San Francisco has been on foot for three years. Only in the last two months has much been done. During this time the movement has become tangible in the organizations of the three states and national congressmen have been appealed to.

With the meeting of the delegates of the Tri-State Good Roads Assn. in San Francisco it is anticipated that the military road will be made one of the paramount issues.

Meeting with this organization in San Francisco, September 15 to 17 will be the Pan-American Roads Conference, the American Highway Association, the International Engineering Congress and the American Society of Civil Engineers.

With the strong men of these organizations backing the Military Highway it is expected that the project can be launched with greater force at the next meeting at San Francisco.

The letters from the local Chamber asked Portland and Seattle specifically to put forward strong resolutions with reference to the project to send the movement at the San Francisco meeting.

In his letter here, George H. P. says, "I am the secretary of the Portland Good Roads Association and I have been in touch with Seattle and Portland in connection with the same project in view of the Association. Enclosed herewith is one more than a month or more of over 2000 in the last six months. A regular movement for the education on these lines is now being held. We want to carry on so that California, Oregon and Washington are among the better states of good road building."

R. J. Long is a nephew of Col. Ross and was a step appearing chap of probably thirty years old. His first visit here was several months ago and he returned later to start a black sand machine.

Long on his first appearance here was accompanied with sheriff V. Fred Johnson, Jr. the latter with Deputy Sheriff Andrew P. Davis and the latter is sponsor for one \$25 draft which Long cashed. The draft was cashed in Marshfield and it has been returned to the Los Angeles bank as no good.

Whether Long will be able to raise the money and explain it satisfactorily remains to be determined.

J. L. Koontz says that he was handed a check draft from Ralph Long for \$150 which he sent through and had it returned to him so that he was not out any money. He will see on hand the check and machine he made for Long.

Paul Koontz found his dealing with Long to be about as high as he has \$150 on the deal, he states.

Dr. Straw Renders Report on Preparations for Big Moose Day in San Francisco, July 25

Five new Moose were ushered into the herd at an enthusiastic meeting of the lodge last evening and further preparations were made for the coming big Moose Day at San Francisco on July 25. Dr. E. E. Straw, who recently returned from the south, submitted his report and again verified the fact that the Coos County Moose will be the first lodge in the parade.

The suddenness of the move and the number of it, the "copping" of the best place in the line of march by the local herdmen was a startling discovery for the lodge from San Francisco and many of the Eastern moose.

"Just forget that," Dr. Straw told Walter E. Dorn, deputy supreme dictator of the San Francisco lodge when the latter told of getting the first place in the parade. Mr. Dorn was abashed, Dr. Straw showed him letters from James J. Davis, supreme dictator, making all arrangements for Coos County to have the advantage point.

The new Moose who were initiated last night were: A. Forbes, Edward H. Meade, C. W. Seiff, James M. Howard and Earl L. Powell and those who were favorably voted on were: A. A. Hillstrom, Wm. J. Edwards, F. J. Keltz and John W. Pfannkuch.

A committee consisting of Dr. Straw, Al G. Dungen, Frank Callahan, Frank Parsons and E. H. Meade was appointed to wait on the Chamber of Commerce in Coos and Curry Counties with the purpose of securing aid in making the concert subject to the fair where for five days it will be held as one of the biggest advertising features from this section.

Temper measure of the Bandon lodge was present and addressed the meeting. He spoke of the importance of having the best in the exhibition and of the advertising value to Coos County of such an attraction. He said that in view of the benefits that would be derived by this locality, he thought it would be a good thing for a committee to present the matter to the commercial bodies of the different Coos County cities with the view of possibly receiving some aid.

AWARDS CONTRACT

EDWARD SANBERG, PORTLAND, LOW BIDDER ON SEWER

Seven Bids Received—North Bend Discusses Taking Over of Water System From Company

Awarding of a \$25,000 sewer contract, the orders for plans and specifications for hard surfacing their share of the Bay road and the launching of a movement to take over the water system or the city last evening marked one of the liveliest meetings ever held by the North Bend City Council. Edward Sanberg, a Portland contractor, had the lowest bid and was awarded the contract. His figure was \$19,953.84 more than \$2500 lower than the next bid, of which there were seven in all.

It is said that 18 sets of specifications were sent from the office of City Engineer Cavanaugh. The receiving back of but seven bids leads to the belief that several contractors had "cold feet" and drew out, for it was known that at least eight were here yesterday from outside points.

The list of bids opened were as follows: Longston Construction Company, Portland, \$29,092.60; Jacobson, Bide & Co., Portland, \$26,673.85; McLean & McLain, \$24,985.78; C. G. Randles, Portland, \$22,640.33; James Kennedy Co., Hillsboro, \$22,094.44; Tibbets Pacific Co., Portland, \$21,576.63; Edward Sanberg, Portland, \$19,953.84.

Want Own Waterworks. That an effort should be made by North Bend to secure at least an offer from the Coos Bay Water Company for the North Bend distribution was the opinion of Councilman Fred Hollister. The move met with no opposition from any of the Council members. City Attorney Derbyshire was given instructions to investigate the matter with the water company. The charter of North Bend provides that if possible there shall be municipal ownership of water and light systems.

The widening of the present 125-foot city dock, thereby straightening a bad bend in the harbor line was sanctioned by the Council. The warehouse which is now on the property will also be widened. This work to be done at once.

The bid of the Warren Construction Company to do two more blocks of paving on Sherman Avenue and one on Virginia and McPherson was accepted and this work will be started without delay. Given Grading Contract. Paddock, Beck and Webber, of North Bend, were given the contract for the \$11,000 grading of Virginia from Pony Inlet to the city dock and for two blocks on McPherson. There were two bids submitted. The first firm bid 49 cents a yard on the excavation, 45 cents a yard on wheel-barrow work and \$200 for the rolling. Moon & Barley made a figure of 45 1/2 cents on the excavation, 45 cents on the wheel-barrow work and \$200 for the rolling. This work is to be completed this summer and later is to be planked.

Hard Surface Bay Road.

Hard surfacing of the Bay road between North Bend and Marshfield is bound to come declare the city fathers of the neighboring city, and to this end they last night instructed City Engineer Cavanaugh to draw up plans and specifications for the paving from Washington street to the southern limits of North Bend. The move has not yet been discussed by the Marshfield Council.

A clean-up day for North Bend was sanctioned by the Council, when they agreed to aid the Thimble Club in the work of paying half the expenses.

Father Has Stroke.—Jen and Joel Ostling today received a wire from Stockholm stating that their father has had a stroke and is very ill, though it is stated there is hope and another wire will be sent if he becomes worse. Mr. Ostling is 58 years of age and has been a very strong man. He is a prominent piano manufacturer of Sweden and is known through Europe. There have been few deaths for years in the Ostling family, according to Joel Ostling, who says that his father's mother and father are still living and also his three sisters and two brothers.

PICNIC ENTHUSES

DAIRYMEN OF COUNTY GATHER JUNE 16

Sclander Ranch On Catching Inlet To Be Scene of Big Stimulus To Dairying Industry

Enthusiasm over the picnic of the Coos Bay Cow Testing Association at the Sclander ranch on Catching Inlet, June 16, to which every dairyman of the county is invited is rapidly growing and already the farmers are making preparations to come from miles around to make the day a gala one, notable in Coos River history.

J. L. Smith, county agriculturist, was here this morning making further preparations for the affair. He states that the testers from all associations in the county will be present, with them will come many of the Coquille Valley dairymen.

At the present time word is anxiously awaited from the Oregon Agricultural College as to whether or not a representative will be here from the college. It is possible that Prof. Graves of the dairy department may be present. Stimulation of the dairy move-

ment in the county is the explanation of the countryside picnic.
