**IN JAIL TOGETHER**  
 ONLY OCCUPANTS OF COUNTY BASTILE MAKE QUEER PAIR

One Deserted His Family While the Other Offended Against the Same Family

(Special to The Times.)  
 COQUILLE, Ore., June 12.—Two men stood behind the bars of the county jail yesterday as the only occupants of place. Both are married men but one is young and the other much older. The older man faces the charge of deserting his family ten years ago and the younger man must answer to the charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl, one of the family which the older man deserted, his daughter in fact.

The younger man is Neva Hatcher who has been tried once but in whose case the jury disagreed. He will be tried again. It is alleged he was guilty of wronging the minor daughter of his older jail companion, John Stillwell. Another young man, Earl Ensele, was found guilty of the same charge and sent to the penitentiary.

When these matters were brought before the grand jury it was learned that Mrs. Stillwell and her daughter had been keeping up a little ranch near Bandon and had been doing the work themselves. When the grand jury found that Stillwell had deserted his family ten years ago they decided to indict him also. When he left this county Stillwell went as a member of a traveling sect known as "God's Regular Army." There was a warrant out for him once before and he made a short visit here some years ago but escaped arrest in some way.

Now he must face the charge of desertion and await his trial in jail with young Hatcher against whom the same family has a grievance. Stillwell was located and arrested at Vancouver, Wash., and was brought back from that place Thursday night.

**COQUILLE WILL MAKE MORE FILLS**  
 Will Use Dredge Seattle While Up River to Better Condition of Low Places

Coquille intends to take advantage of the presence of the dredge Seattle to do some needed filling of low places according to the following of the Sentinel:

As the dredge Seattle will probably finish the job of furnishing a channel from Coquille to Bandon 10 feet in depth and a hundred and fifty feet in width during the next two weeks, there is a plan on foot to keep her at work here enough longer to fill the swale at the east end of Front street which runs on up between the Tuttle House and the livery stable. It is estimated that it would cost 50 cents a yard to fill this hole with dry earth by the use of teams; but the sand in the bed of the river is nearly 20 feet in depth before the clay is reached and the dredge company agrees to make just as much of a fill as is desired, by pumping this sand into the hole, at a cost of only 20 cents per cubic yard. It will probably be several years before there is a dredge up the river again and the opportunity is not one to be lost.

**SIUSLAW JETTY WORK WILL START SOON**  
 Bids Will Be Asked for In A Few Days by Major Morrow

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—Major Morrow of the engineering corps received authority to go ahead with north and south jetties at the Siuslaw river and in a few days bids will be advertised for. The south jetty is to be extended farther out than the north jetty. The Work will be paid for by a government appropriation and money raised by Port of Siuslaw bonds.

**KEEP LAUNCH ON NIGHT FERRY SERVICE**  
 Judge James Watson Believes Traffic Not Enough to Justify Big Ferry at Night.

In all probability the present arrangement of a gasoline launch for the night ferry service between Marshfield and Eastside will be retained, according to a statement last evening by County Judge Watson. He stated there is not enough heavy traffic in the evening to justify the added expense of running the ferry Transit.

Bids are again being asked for by the County Court, he said, for a gasoline boat to take the run. Figures by Captain Cavanaugh, at present operating the old launch Union on the run show that 1540 persons used the night service last month.
