WATERFRONT NEWS

The Breakwater was among the vessels at Portland on which the wireless apparatus was tested this week by V. Ford Graves, radio engineer for the Department of Commerce.

The Roamer is undergoing repairs on her engine and probably will not be back on the Gold Beach and Port Orford run until next week some time.

Word has been received here that the gasoline schooner Rustler has left Portland with a cargo of freight for Gold Beach and Wedderburn.

MORE FREIGHTERS

Of interest in Portland is the fact that soon there are to be two more large sized freighters on the Pacific Coast, brought by the American-Hawaiian Steamship Company. This company will then have 28 vessels plying on the coast. One of them, the Nevada is now loading in Portland, another, the Nebraskan, was torpedoed off the Irish coast a few days ago but was not sunk.

One of the remaining vessels of the one-time fleet of 52 that belonged to the late Captain A. M. Simpson, the schooner Encore, has just left Bellingham with a cargo of lumber and is bound for Cape Town, Africa. The schooner was last on Coos Bay several months ago at which time one of the crew, a Chilean, jumped overboard and was drowned.

For the first time since October 21 wheat in Portland has been loaded for shipping at \$1 a bushel. A British bark has just cleared with a cargo for the United Kingdom. During February wheat advanced to a higher price than was ever before paid for it in the Northwest.

TAKE AMERICAN FLAG

Nine foreign ships were placed under the protection of the American flag last month. They represented 27,843 tons. Four of them had been flying the German flag and five of them the British. During this same period in the United States 173 sailing, steam and unrigged vessels of 19,494 tons gross were built and officially numbered. Of the 173 vessels, eight are sailers, 121 are steamers and 44 are unrigged.

main channel across the bar. Over an entrance 3500 feet it is said the water has an average depth of 27 feet. The bar dredge Chinook is kept constantly at work 24 hours a day and with three shifts of men working on the entrance.

The survey made a week ago on the Coos Bay bar by Captain Polhemus showed that here there is a depth of at least 20 feet at dead low water and practically the entire channel is between 22 and 24 feet deep, with a maximum of 28 feet.
