THE NEW DANCES

TURKEY TROTS, BUNNY HUGS AND RAGS DON'T GO.

Dancing Masters in National Convention Place Ban on Rag Dances as Vulgar.

This is the day, the date sublime, Record it on the sands of time—Or should we say the sands of crime?

For dancing masters have decreed That they will perpetrate the deed Of slugging with a fatal swat The grizzly bear and turkey trot, The bunny hug, the tango glide, And though a thousand times men tried Such things to do these teachers brag That they'll annihilate the "rag"; Will give the vulgar thing no chance By ringing in another dance. But what's the use and where's the praise If this new dancing and its ways Surpass the rag as silly craze?

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—The "smooth one-step," the "Venus waltz" and the "Balboa" are the three new dances that are to be presented to Terpsichorean enthusiasts by the International Dancing Masters' Association when they scatter to their various fields of endeavor. Such was the decision by the 22nd annual convention in session here.

The "smooth one-step" is designated to be the deadly enemy of the rag. It aims to drive all vulgarity from the dance floors of America, and eliminate all suggestion of the once popular "dip" and "whirl." It has already found its way in an undeveloped condition into certain New York cafes. The dancing masters say they have added finesse and polish.

Plans and Specifications. In the "smooth one-step" four movements predominate. First comes the "fan step" which is a smooth step to the right (for the man) executed twice. This gives way to a "progressive turn," which involves one complete turn in four even moves. The "twinkle" step, a measure familiar to dancers as a quick step, becomes a smooth movement of complicated execution, ending with the "corte," a slight eccentric double step forward and back, which completes the dance.

The "Venus waltz" is the creation of George R. Puckett, the San Francisco dancing master. This waltz is a combination of four Bostons, one step and a hop of the "Spanish draw" class and one Spanish draw backward.

The Very Latest. The "Balboa" is the very latest Terpsichorean whirl, officially so designated by the International Dancing Masters' Association in their convention. It obviates the vulgar. It eradicates the rag. It proposes to appeal to all classes of dance enthusiasts in the United States.

The "Balboa" is the creation of Frank H. Norman, of Montreal, Canada, former president of the Association, and dancing master par excellence, who danced before the King of England six years ago. He wanted to call his dance "The Frisco" but local dancing masters made him acquainted with the fact that "Frisco" as a nickname for San Francisco is frowned upon in the Exposition city. Wherefore "Balboa."

The Balboa is epitomized as follows by its creator. "It is a dance designed to combine the old idea of straight dancing with the modern ideas of new steps. It harmonizes the best of the old and the new into a combination of the one step with the two step. It starts with a one-step with an arch turn, followed by a maxixe two step and eight waltz steps."
