# Newsy Briefs From All Over the County

## TESTING THE WASTE ARE INVITED HERE

**GOVERNMENT LEARNING CHEMICAL VALUE OF WOODS**  
Expert Now at Bandon Trying Out Extraction of Turpentine from Port Orford Cedar

The chemical value of Port Orford white cedar is being investigated by the government and it may lead to an important industry. Telling of the investigation the Bandon Recorder prints the following:

M. G. Donk, chemical engineer from the Bureau of Chemistry at Washington, D. C. detailed to the University of Idaho at Moscow to make tests of waste from the mills of the coast to determine their value as chemical producers, was in Bandon gathering samples of Port Orford cedar for experimental purposes. His visit is a direct result of sending samples of cedar pitch to the University of Idaho by Col. R. H. Rosa. This test showed the quantity of turpentine and higher oils to be obtained from a cord of this cedar as 170 gallons where as the usual amount is about one third of that quantity.

Mr. Donk thought the samples submitted might be better than the ordinary run of the wood and came himself to take his own samples with a view of making a final test of the value of the cedar for distillation purposes.

Col. Rosa happened to be away attending the meeting of the port commission at Coquille on Friday when Mr. Donk arrived and the latter had ample opportunity to take his own samples free from guidance or suggestion.

People acquainted with the quality of the cedar feel positive that the results will come up to the previous test. The amount of turpentine in the cedar is so great that it affects the water of the lumber camps where it grows and some can not drink the water.

For a number of years the government has been experimenting to determine the value of wood waste and have conducted experiments in a number of places with excellent results.

## RIVERS AND HARBORS COMMITTEE MAY SEE COOS BAY

J. N. Teal Suggests They Be Asked But Port Commissioner Had Already Done So

J. N. Teal of Portland wrote to Coos Bay suggesting that the commercial bodies invite the members of the rivers and harbors committee of the House of Representatives to visit this locality on the occasion of their visit to the coast. This had already been done by the Port of Coos Bay which body agreed to pay the expenses of the committee from San Francisco to Coos Bay if they would make the trip.

Mr. Teal's letter, which was directed to J. W. Bennett, is as follows: "The River and Harbor Committee of the House of Representatives is to visit this state. They were invited to visit the Coast by the Legislature of California, that State paying their expenses to California. The Portland Chamber of Commerce has invited them to extend their visit to Oregon, and Washington commercial bodies have invited them to go to Washington. Both these invitations have been accepted. The expense, of course, is borne by the respective commercial bodies.

"We are all desirous, if it is possible, that the Committee should visit Coos Bay, and we intend to urge them to do so. What I would like to know is whether or not your Chamber of Commerce would pay any portion of the expenses of the visit to Oregon. You will understand that our intention to have them visit Coos Bay is not based upon the request that any part of the expenses be paid by your Chamber, but at the same time as the trip is being handled in this way, I thought you would be glad to aid in the matter. This is a chance in a life time for Coos Bay to put before the entire Committee their situation in a way that will be effective. I am not advised as yet just when they expect to visit this State, but probably the middle or latter part of July."

## GARDINER MAN SENT TO JAIL

Found Guilty of Bootlegging and Must Serve Sentence of 55 Days

(Special to The Times.)  
**GARDINER, Or., June 19.**—John Compton, of Gardiner, who was brought here a few days ago following the return of an indictment by the grand jury charging him with bootlegging, appeared before Judge Skipworth in the Circuit Court for sentence.

Attorney O. H. Porter, who represented the prisoner in the absence of Attorney J. A. Buchanan, made a brief talk on behalf of the defendant. Attorney Porter said that he understood this was the first time that Mr. Compton had been arrested. He claimed that the defendant was not in the business of selling liquor, but was merely trapped by a state agent, or "spotter," who had been sent to Gardiner by the local officers.

District Attorney Neuner said the defendant had a bad reputation, but as far as he knew this was the first time he had been arrested for bootlegging.

In passing sentence Judge Skipworth said he would take into consideration the statement of both the District Attorney and he counsel for the defendant. In view of the statements made by these men the court said he would be lenient in imposing sentence. It was then that Judge Skipworth sentenced the prisoner to a term of 55 days in the county jail, couple with a fine of \$50. Being without funds Mr. Compton will have to pass the next 55 days in the county jail.
