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AN UNJUST SCHOOL LAW

TODAY is school election day but under the laws of Oregon a person living in a school district of the first class, such as Marshfield may not vote unless his or her name appears as a taxpayer on the last assessment roll.

The law as it stands with reference to the qualification of women voters at school elections is absurd and unfair. Women are particularly interested in school affairs and are particularly qualified to judge of school problems and act upon them.

There is no law on the statute books more improper or more unjust. If there are to be qualifications for school elections beyond those of the ordinary elector those qualifications must assuredly should not be such as to make out laws of women who have children in school and who therefore come most directly in touch with school affairs and are most vitally concerned in the proper administration of the schools.

The women of Oregon should get together in a united way and see to it that this relic of barbarism is taken off the Statute books of Oregon.

GOOD CITIZENSHIP MAY BUY TIMBER

BISHOP SUMNER SPEAKS ON HIS RELATION TO CHURCH

In First Sermon Outlines His Plans and Hopes for the Diocese Oregon

The Episcopal Church was taxed to its full seating capacity yesterday morning to hear the address of Bishop Walter Taylor Sumner of the occasion of his initial visit to the Marshfield parish. A class of seven-teen was presented for confirmation by the rector of Emmanuel church, Rev. R. E. Browning. The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion and special music was given by the choir. On next Thursday evening a reception will be tendered Bishop Sumner at Guild Hall when an opportunity will be given all members and friends of the church to meet the new Bishop and hear of his plans for the advancement of the Church in Oregon.

In his sermon yesterday Bishop Sumner spoke on Good Citizenship, the attitude of service to the church and community being given special stress.

Regarding plans and hopes for the diocese of Oregon three special wishes of the Bishop were advanced.

The first was missions, "for without missionary work, said Bishop Sumner, a church soon dies of dry rot. A church which has no interest outside of the four walls of its church edifice narrows its vision until its efficiency in the work of Christ is gone.

The second was the conservation of child life for the church. "The church opens its doors and cries for the child and gets it not," said the bishop "and the fault lies not with the child, not with the public schools as is so often claimed, not with the traps and pitfalls of the streets but with the parents. "What are you parents doing toward building up a character that will withstand the temptations offered to your child? What religious instructions are you giving your child? I should like to see the doors of your parish room open very day in the week for the entertainment and instruction of the children of Marshfield, that there might be healthful, recreation and amusements to offset the many vicious pastimes so easy for the child to find."

The third hope of Bishop Sumner was to found in Oregon a native clergy. "Since the Episcopal church was built in Oregon there have been but two candidates for holy orders from the state," said the bishop, "and Oregon needs clergymen for her many parishes and missions, many more than the Eastern seminaries can furnish." The bishop spoke most earnestly to the young men and boys in the congregation urging them to consider the ministry as offering the greatest field for service to humanity. He spoke also to parents urging them to dedicate their boys to the service of Christ. "Some will say," said Bishop Sumner. "That they cannot afford to educate their boy for the ministry. Give me the boy and I will get the money for his education."

MYSTERIOUS TRIP OF FIVE PORTLAND MEN INTO WOODS

Returns From Vicinity of Fall Creek After Three Days Trip on Horseback

Speculation is rife as to the outcome of a visit here this week of five men from Portland who are known to be interested in timber and who have just returned from a two of three days trip with Ben McMullen, into the vicinity of Fall Creek above Allegany. The men are E. J. Noble, A. P. Noble, George R. Sallor, H. P. Beuhner and Philip Beuhner. They returned to Portland today on the early stage.

"Just looking over the timber," said Ben McMullen after he returned last evening. Mr. McMullen has done considerable work for Fred A. Kriba, a prominent timberman of Portland. It is known that Mr. Kriba owns about 1,800 acres of valuable forest land in the vicinity of Fall Creek and about 10,000 acres are owned by the C. A. Smith Company.

The men took five horses with them and a camping outfit, being gone for three days. All of the men already own small holdings of timber in Coos and Curry counties and it is understood that they have good financial backing. Whether or not a sale of timber is contemplated is not made public though Mr. McMullen vaguely hinted there might possibly be something of that nature take place.

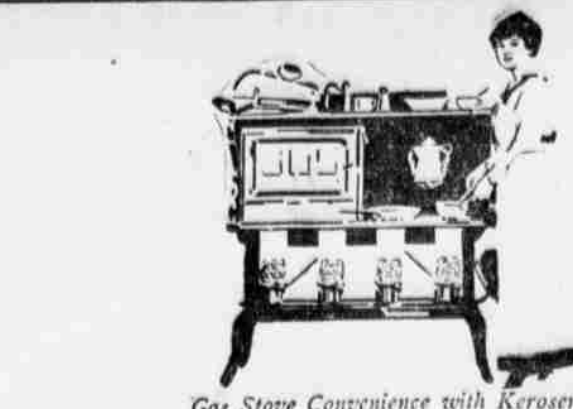
