 Coos Bay Cow Testing Association Host to All Dairymen and Their Families of Coos Bay

Farmers and their families will come from all over Coos Bay on Wednesday to attend the dairymen's picnic at the Charles Selander ranch, "The Silver Maple" dairy on Catching Inlet. It is expected there will be one of the largest crowds ever gathered there for a picnic on that date and proper boat service is to be established that all may come and go from their homes on the various inlets and rivers.
 Plans have been entirely completed for the big day according to J. L. Smith, county agriculturist, who was here on Saturday afternoon. Two speakers, Prof. E. B. Pitts and Prof. W. A. Barr are expected to be present and will give short addresses.
 To illustrate the work of the cow testing associations Mr. Smith says that he will have a "picture show" illustrating by lantern slides the results that have been accomplished by the five associations of the county.
 During the year that these associations have been established Mr. Smith and his various testers have taken pictures of herds and the conditions in which they have been kept. As these have improved further pictures have been taken and in this way it is now possible to trace the advance of the dairying industry under the new system.
 But not only are these to be lessons for the farmers and their families to learn but there will be amusement as well. For this reason the fat men, the skinny men, the married men and women, too, are going to race for the ice cream and there will be stunts for the kiddies as well.
 A definite program will be ready on Wednesday to be followed so that everything can be touched upon before the boats return in the afternoon. The Coos Bay Cow Testing Association, under William Black, is the host of the occasion and invites every farmer and his family of Coos Bay to attend the picnic.
