

Coos Bay School Districts Hold Elections

POWERS IS BEATEN REPORT OF SCHOOLS

BENNETT SWANTON ELECTED SCHOOL DIRECTOR

Unexpected Opposition Sprung in Annual Election Carries off Victory—Small Vote Cast

Instead of being simply a ratification meeting to endorse the reelection of A. H. Powers, a surprise was slipped into the annual school election in Marshfield last evening with the result that Bennett Swanton defeated Mr. Powers for director by a vote of 38 to 18.

Owing to a general belief that there would be no opposing candidate, there was a small attendance when the meeting opened at 7:30 but gradually before the meeting closed at 8 o'clock friends of Mr. Powers who were present stated "that one had been slipped over on them." The first intimation of it came when, after the reading of the annual report, Chairman A. H. Powers called for nominations for director for the three-year term.

Henry Sengstacken nominated A. H. Powers for reelection. Harry Winkler nominated Bennett Swanton and it was seconded by M. H. Mulloy. For school clerk, John F. Hall was the only one nominated. A motion made the election of John F. Hall unanimously carried, Harry Winkler's being the only dissenting vote. The vote on director was by ballot, Carl Albrecht and Harry Winkler being appointed tellers.

Bennett Swanton, the new director, was not present at the meeting but was called over immediately after the election and sworn in as director. He has long been a resident of Marshfield and this is the first office he has held here. He is an attorney and a member of the law firm of J. W. Bennett.

TWO CONSOLIDATE

Ross District and Esterbeck District Will Unite.

Arthur Matson was elected director in place of Alex Matson for the three-year term and Harry Russell was re-elected by a large majority as clerk of District No. 12, known as Ross district.

In the Esterbeck District No. 56, Fred Selander was elected director for three years to succeed W. B. Farrin and Herman Sanford was elected clerk. Leonard Masters is the out-going clerk.

Consolidation of school districts No. 12 and 56 was the result of yesterday's voting in the two districts, though in the Esterbeck district the votes were hotly contested, the final result being 11 to 5 in favor of the consolidation. There must be a meeting of the districts at a later date to consider the site for the school building and also the uniting must be acted upon by the boundary board to make it legal.

AGAINST JOINING.

South Slough Probably Against Consolidation of Three Districts.

From incomplete returns it is indicated that the three school districts on South Slough will not consolidate. All three could not be heard from today, as they are isolated and had not reported, but in District 61 there was one vote against consolidation and this will beat the proposition as it is necessary for a majority in all three in order to insure the consolidation.

GLOA BACK AGAIN

For another load of supplies the gasoline schooner Gloa, under contract to the Seaburg cannery, has returned from her first trip to Rogue River and expects to leave either tonight or in the morning with a second load of boxes and cans. JUDGE JOHN F. HALL GIVES INTERESTING FIGURES

Cost Over \$45,700 to Maintain the Marshfield Public Schools Last Year—Expenditures Given

The annual school report of the Marshfield district submitted by Judge John F. Hall, for over 20 years clerk of the district, gave some interesting facts concerning the school year just closed.

There were 27 teachers employed during the year, six men and 21 women. Of these, five hold life certificates and 22 hold five-year, one-year, county or city certificates. There were 30 school rooms maintained and 188 pupils were enrolled above the eighth grade. Judge Hall estimated that there were 400 entitled to vote at the school election. There are 1500 volumes in the school library, 150 volumes being added during the year. The financial report is as follows:
