LUMBER SHIPPING RATES INCREASED

Coastwise Ships Charging More and Cargoes to Australia Cost Much

Coastwise lumber rates have advanced 50 cents a thousand feet in the report from the north. An American ship of the Grace Line is said to have cleared from Portland a few days ago for Australia at \$22.50 a ton. Previous to the war this rate to the Antipodes was \$3.50 a ton.

Passenger traffic has been on the increase from northern ports to San Francisco and announcement has been made in Portland that the Great Northern, the Northern Pacific and the Big Three fleet have practically all first class berths filled up until August 1 and some even to September 1.

It is said that several ships are being withdrawn from the Portland-San Francisco run which will in all probability effect the boats of the North Pacific line that come in here, having a tendency, it is said, to increase their freight shipments.

NEED GUN POWDER

Ships to Go to Chile Ports to Hurray Gun-Powder Manufacture

Nitrate is at a premium not only in the ports of the warring nations but in American ports as well. Several ships have been taken from coast runs to aid in hurrying saltpetre cargoes to the gun powder factories. The latest ship to go is the Siskiyou which has been taken by W. R. Grace and Company. The rate on nitrate from the ports of Northern Chile is said to have soared to \$15 a ton to New York.

Chile produces a majority of the nitrate, or saltpetre of the world. This is used mainly for gun powder manufacture. Sailing ships have for years piled constantly between Calcutta Buena, Iquique and Antofogasta, sailing thence around the Horn to Europe. The bulk of the ships in this trade have been German, French and English, with a few Italian vessels.
