WARNING GIVEN

THE United States attorney, Mr. Reames, in connection with the recent decision of the supreme court regarding the O. and C. lands, gives specific warning to the public not to pay any location fees to anyone and not to attempt to locate on these lands at this time. He states that according to the decision none of those who have filed on the lands will have any preference rights. Thousands of persons have paid fees of as high as \$150 to be located on lands which they were led to believe they would secure. They are now publicly warned not to attempt anything of the kind or to pay any fees. In the face of this warning if any choose to pay location fees to promoters they have no one to blame but themselves if they find that they have been victimized.

PUBLIC IS WARNED

ATTORNEY REAMES SAYS NOT TO PAY LOCATION FEES

Shows that 20,000 Persons Have Filed on O. & C. Lands in This State

United States Attorney Reames in interviews regarding the recent decision of the O. & C. land cases is quoted as giving warning to the people of Oregon not to pay to locators any fees. Mr. Reames says: "The public should again be warned against trying to locate upon these lands at this time, and from paying location fees to anybody for such locations. There are 2,300,000 acres in the grant. Divide this into 160 acre tracts and you have a trifle over 14,000 tracts and yet 20,000 applications have been filed. In the recent trials against land fraud promoters the evidence showed that as many as eight filed on the same claim. It would seem to be impossible to do common justice to the intervenors even if the court had held in favor of them." Mr. Reames points out that the 20,000 persons who have filed on O. & C. lands will not have any preference rights at all according to the court's decision.

MILWAUKEE CLAIMS FIRST MARINE R. F. D.

Coos Bay Institute's Service One Day Ahead of Northern Boat, Hence is First in Oregon

Loud "crowing" of the Milwaukee post office that it has instituted the first marine rural free delivery in Oregon has brought about the authentic discovery that Coos Bay instituted her service one day ahead of the northerners. Hence the local post office can well lay claim to having instituted the first delivery of this type in Oregon. The Milwaukee service is on the Willamette river and extends from the Portland Rowing Club just above Portland as far up the river as Oswego and Magoon's Landing. It is under the direction of B. L. Hageman, postmaster at Milwaukee. On Coos Bay the service was instituted June 16 on the Express up the South Coos River, and extends from below the forks up as far as Camp 1.
