Furnishes Local Trade.—E. E. Johnson who was here last evening from Coquille states that he is operating his mill right along now. Mr. Johnson has the plant of the Coquille Mill and Mercantile Company.

Takes Money to Valley.—Officer Walter Richardson left this afternoon on the train for Myrtle Point, going over in charge of a Wells-Fargo shipment of gold and silver to the bank there. The money is in a strong box and came down this morning from Portland on the Kilburn.

Completes Work First.—P. M. Hall-Lewis, county Roadmaster states that he does not expect to leave Coos County until he has completed the season's work. He is intending to finish all projects in the county for which he prepared plans before

going to California. This, it is understood, will be an indefinite time.

Too Big a Crowd.—D. L. Foote says that the auto accident near Allegany last Sunday was due to too big a load getting on the machine. He says there were 15 on the auto besides luggage and this sprung the body of the car and the spring so that the brake rods would not work. He said that the car was otherwise in good shape.

Tide is Low.—Today was a very low tide and according to the charts it will be still lower tomorrow. According to the gauge in the office of the City Engineer it was down today to two feet and two inches and it is said that the rock oysters and the shell fish are easy to get and for this reason it is expected there will be many at the beach tomorrow.

Safe in Europe.—Letters have been received here from Fred Knapp who left some time ago for Sweden on a visit to relatives there. Mr. Knapp was accompanied by his brother from California. He writes that he reached Sweden safely, the boat on which he was traveling having managed to dodge the submarines.

Hawley is Busy.—Efforts were made to secure Congressman Hawley to speak here at the July 4 exercises but this is probably an impossibility because, according to a Portland paper, the representative will attend the Chautauqua at Gladstone where it is said he is slated as a speaker. This leaves the local committee unable to find a speaker as yet after the invitation has been extended to L. J. Simpson, Senator Lane and Representative Hawley.

Want Plants Sent.—J. H. Pinkerton was in from his cranberry ranch at North Inlet this morning. He was much displeased that the large box of cranberry plants which he hurried down here some time ago had not yet been shipped to the exhibit at San Francisco. He said the plants are now at the Chamber of Commerce and unless they are sent immediately they will die. J. A. Ward has written from San Francisco asking that the plants be sent him.

Child is Buried.—The little two and one half year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Harkshaw, of Ferndale who died Thursday night from ptomaine poisoning, was buried this morning from the Dungan Undertaking Parlor. The services were in charge of Rev. Stubbfield. The little girl had eaten fish for dinner on Thursday and soon after was taken violently ill and before long was beyond medical aid. Mrs. Harkshaw, the mother, was also sick for a time.

To Record Tide.—An auto record tide gauge has been purchased by the city and the Port jointly from the Coast Equipment Company and this has been installed in the office of City Engineer Gidley. The gauge is in the office and extends down through the floor of the city hall building into the bay and thus it will be possible to keep constantly the tide averages of each day, a matter of great importance in the installing of permanent sewers on the dredge fills.

All The Way Through.—On Monday, according to Frank D. Coban of the Owl Drug Store the first auto stage of this year will come through from Roseburg via the Myrtle Point road. This is the stage line operated by Kolhagen and Banks who also have the main mail contract and it is expected that every day thereafter there will be a regular stage running through to and from Roseburg. It is said that the operators of the line for several weeks have been aiding the county officials in making repairs on the road, especially through the canyon so that there will be no delay in the service.
