**Leave in Auto**—Edgar McDaniel, proprietor of the Coos Bay Harbor, accompanied by his family, left Sunday in an auto for San Francisco to attend the exposition.

**Move to Powers**—H. E. Coffin and family will move to Powers Wednesday to make their home. Mr. Coffin is in charge of the Smith-Powers offices which were moved out a few days.

**Post Office is Gay**—All day yesterday workmen hurried about in the post office and this morning it was noticed a new coat of paint had been applied to the greater portion of the inside of the building.

**Many Plants**—Frank Laise took 1,000 Wapato (wild potato) plants down to his ranch in the Sand Hills yesterday to plant in one of the ponds there. He had them shipped here from Wisconsin. They are said to be especially fine food for wild ducks and Mr. Laise is introducing them on his game preserve.

**Court Reconvens**—Judge Coke returned to Coquille this morning and the circuit court reconvened after a few days recess. A new jury will be impaneled to retry the case of Neva Hatcher, a young man of Coquille, who was granted a new trial in a criminal case. It is expected that the term will last but a few days.

**Auto To Dance**—Three auto loads or more left here on Saturday evening to attend the dance at Myrtle Point, returning in the wee sma' hours of the morning. Among those who went over from here were John Noble, John Teleson, William Haglund, Joe Williams, Jack Ferguson, Earl Chisholm, James Merchant and Mike Burke. **Letter From Scotland**—A letter has been received by A. P. Davis from a cousin of his who lives in Scotland. In speaking of the sinking of the Lusitania the cousin said "It was murder, premeditated" and declared the feeling that had been stirred in the whole of the United Kingdom because of it is extremely bitter. Questions were asked as to the general feeling in the United States regarding the war and especially the sinking of the big boat. Communications from the British Isles to Americans generally ask the question, as to how we here stand on the great war.
