GERMAN NOTE MADE PUBLIC

U. S. Will Not Accept German's Right to Destroy Vessels Carrying Contraband

WAITING FOR REPLY

It is Asked That Refusal to Settle by Direct Diplomacy Be Re-considered

WOULD ACCEPT INDEMNITY

Money for Loss of the Vessel William P. Frye Will be Sufficient Reparation Provided That It is Paid Without Any Delay

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 29.—With the publication today of the American note to Germany concerning the destruction of the American ship William P. Frye by the Prinz Eitel Friederich, interest here centered in the character of the reply the German government would make. The communication asks that Germany reconsider the refusal to settle by direct diplomatic negotiations, instead of by prize court proceedings, the claim presented on behalf of the captain and owners of the Frye. The American government declares it will accept indemnity, if paid promptly, as a reparation.

It is made clear that the United States will not accept Germany's contention that she had a right to stop the carrying of contraband by American ships "By the destruction of the contraband and the ship carrying it."

BRYAN AT LINCOLN

FORMER SECRETARY OF STATE ARRIVES HOME TODAY

Will Speak Tonight and Leaves Tomorrow on a Trip to San Francisco

LINCOLN, Neb., June 29.—William Jennings Bryan, accompanied by Mrs. Bryan, was met by a party of personal friends this morning upon the return of the former secretary of state to his home. They are the guests of Mayor Charles W. Bryan, a brother of W. J. Bryan. The latter will speak tonight on "The Farmer, a Friend of Peace." He will leave tomorrow for San Francisco.

CHARGE IS SERIOUS

SAID BRITISH KILLED GERMANS WHO LAID DOWN ARMS

Chancellor of the Exchequer Says When Question Asked it is Scandalous and False.

LONDON, June 29.—"Scandalous and wholly false," is the way Chancellor of the Exchequer McKenna, speaking in the House of Commons this afternoon, stigmatized the question put by Laurence Guinness, Nationalist member, suggesting that the British troops were killing Germans after they laid down their arms, instead of making them prisoners.

ISSUES BANK CALL

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 29.—The Comptroller of currency today issued a call for the condition of all national banks at the close of business June 23.

NOTIFIES GERMANS

GOVERNMENT SPECIFIES WHEN U. S. SHIPS ARE SAILING

Probable Time They Will Pass Through the War Zone is Also Given

(By Associated Press to Coo's Bay Times.) WASHINGTON, D. C., June 29.—The United States government has adopted the practice of notifying the German admiralty through Ambassador Gerard of the time of departure of every passenger ship sailing under the American flag, and approximately the hours during which it will pass through the war zone. This precaution is being taken in order that the German submarine commanders may prevent a repetition of the attack on the American tank ship Gulf Light.

IN FAVOR OF THAW

OPINION GIVEN THAT HE IS NOT AN INSANE MAN

Head of New Hampshire State Insane Hospital is On the Witness Stand Today

(By Associated Press to Coo's Bay Times.) NEW YORK, June 29.—Dr. Chas. P. Bancroft, head of the New Hampshire state hospital for insane, and member of the federal commission which examined Harry K. Thaw in New Hampshire, testified today that in his opinion Thaw was not only sane but always had been sane. Bancroft testified as an expert alienist in the jury proceedings to determine Thaw's mental condition.

"The killing of Stanford White," he said "appeared to us as a passionate, impulsive act growing out of a condition of mind due chiefly to anger and jealousy, which was the final culmination of a series of circumstances that had been bearing down on him for a long time. The act was no product of systematized delusion."

SHIP LINE APPEAL

WANT SEAMAN'S LAW REPEALED BY CONGRESS AS RELIEF

Maritime Association Will Appeal to President Wilson to Call Special Session

(By Associated Press to Coo's Bay Times.) NEW YORK, June 29.—The maritime association of the Port of New York, numbering 800 representatives of domestic and foreign steamship lines entering this port, was preparing today an appeal to President Wilson urging him to call a special session of congress to repeal the seaman's law. Unless the law is repealed the association asserts, long established lines will of necessity be withdrawn.

SENTENCE ROBBERS

MAN AND WOMAN AT BAKER GO TO PENITENTIARY

Found Guilty of Stealing \$7,000 in Gold Bullion When Stage is Held Up

BAKER, Ore., June 29.—Mrs. Molly Bergett, Joe Carlson and "Sour Dough Bill" Halder, found guilty last week of robbing the Darke-Rainbow stage of \$7,000 in gold bullion, were sentenced today to three to fifteen years in the penitentiary by the state circuit court. Notice of appeal was taken.

WILL PAY CLAIMS

BRITISH WILL SETTLE FOR HOLDING STEAMER

Owner of the Wilhelmina Will Get \$100,000 as the First Installment

LONDON, June 29.—The British government today announced that it was its intention to pay \$100,000 as the first installment in the settlement of the claims of the owners of the American steamship Wilhelmina, which was seized by the British authorities while carrying a cargo of food stuffs from New York to Germany.

TEUTONIC ARMY IS ADVANCING

Austro-German Forces Gain Two Important Points in Progress Against Russians

(By Associated Press to Coo's Bay Times.) LONDON, June 29.—According to reports received further pressure by the Teutonic armies in Galicia resulted in important advances for them at two points. In one case the Russians north of Lemberg have been driven at several points over the Galician border. In the other, Von Linsingen forced the Russians back from the Gniza Lipa river, upon which they retired from the Dniester region northward of Halicz.

LITTLE TO REPORT

SAID THAT FOODSTUFF FROM MEXICO SOLD TO RED CROSS

Investigation of An Unofficial Nature Show That Only One Case of the Kind.

LAREDO, Texas, June 29.—An unofficial investigation of reports that foodstuffs have been imported from Mexico, sold to the American Red Cross and sent back to Mexico for free distribution brought to light today only one case of that kind. It was learned that about a month ago a car of beans imported from Mexico via Eagle Pass, was shipped here and later purchased by the Red Cross and distributed in Mexico.

What disposition is being made of them is not stated, but it is presumed they will be assisted to continue on to Vera Cruz.

TOWER GIVES BOND

FURNISHES BAIL OF \$1000 TO AWAIT GRAND JURY

Is Arrested by Lane County Officers on Request of the Coo's County Officials.

GIVES \$1000 BOND (Special to The Times.) COQUILLE, Ore., June 29.

Word has been received here that Charlemagne Tower has given bond in the sum of \$1,000 to await the action of the grand jury. He was arrested twenty miles from Eugene by the Lane County officials. It is understood that his relatives went on his bond.

The fact that Tower has been arrested and given bond, the officers will have no further concern in the case until it comes up at the September grand jury. The charge against Tower is assault with a deadly weapon and it will be up to the grand jury to decide whether this charge shall be made or if there is anything else against him. It is understood that Tower's relatives went his bond. He formerly lived at Junction City and has relatives in that locality. He told a friend here before leaving that he expected to go on a claim in Lane County.

As far as can be learned his wife whom he took away by force, is still with him.

HYDE IN THE CITY

Ben Hyde, the young man who was with Mrs. Tower when her husband took her away from him and who took Mrs. Tower to the dance at North Bend the night the trouble occurred, was about the city this morning.

He asked what had been done about the case and whether or not Tower had given bond. He had little to say further than that he regretted the publicity which the matter had given him and said he did not know matters stood as they did between Tower and his wife, believing that they had been separated for some time. had been separate for some time.

WAS A SINGER

In speaking of the case the Eugene Register says: "Tower was engaged in the cigar store business at Junction City for a number of years previous to going to Coo's Bay four or five years ago. His wife was a singer in a moving picture theater at Junction and they were married later at Cottage Grove, where the girl, who was only about 16 years of age, was similarly engaged. They went to Marshfield where Tower opened a theater. Just previous to going to Coo's Bay Tower's store was destroyed by fire. He and his brother were sleeping in the building at the time the fire broke out and narrowly escaped with their lives."

READY-BUILT HOUSES

The company was recently asked to make a figure on portable houses which were supposed to go to the French government, but a bid was not made, as the request for figures did not come direct, but through other parties in this country expecting to handle the order. The Simpson Company, however, is prepared to furnish ready-cut houses either in large numbers or in small orders. Manager Arkey is making some improvements in the plans which will make it possible to ship the houses in their knockdown form in a very compact package. At the plant of the company there is erected one of these houses to show just what one is like when set up for use. It is believed that there will be a large business in this line later on.

THROUGH AUTO STAGES

The through service will be maintained daily in fine autos. The autos will leave Marshfield at 5 o'clock in the morning and connect with the 2:10 train at Roseburg for Portland.

SIMPSON MILL WILL BE BUSY

Company Gives Orders to Continue Operations for Next Six Months at Least

SHIPMENTS LARGE

Hardy and A. M. Simpson Each Make Two Trips to California This Month

TRIAL RUN WAS SUCCESS

Operations Were Started as Experiment, to Continue if Profitable and Since Manager Arkey Made Report, Is to Keep Going

The Simpson Lumber company at North Bend will continue to operate right along for the next six months at least. When the mill was opened again under the new manager, A. M. Simpson, it was at that time announced that if it would pay to keep the mill going operations would continue. Since Manager Arkey has made his report of what he has been able to accomplish the company has ordered that the mill continue for another six months.

WORK FOR LARGE NUMBER

This means that the Porter mill will be operated as well as the two logging camps. At the McDonald and Vaughan camp about 80 men are employed and at the Tarbell camp about 30. There are 75 men in the mill and with other employes this means a total of about 225 men who will keep right on working for the Simpson company.

The mill has been operating quite extensively since it opened. When the steamer A. M. Simpson, which arrived Saturday night, goes out this will make two trips each made by the Simpson and the steamer Hardy this month. The latter carries 450,000 feet of lumber and the Simpson 800,000 feet making a total of 1,250,000 feet of lumber shipped and in addition \$7000 worth of products from the saw and door factory were shipped.

In addition to these shipments the company has furnished about 1,000,000 of lumber for the bridge work of the Willamette Pacific railroad.
