MANY MUSICAL AFFAIRS AT THE EXPOSITION

Henrik Gjerdrum Writes The Times Interestingly of Concerts and Musical Matters

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23, 1915. Editor Coos Bay Times:

I am writing a few lines about musical affairs which I have had an opportunity to attend while here, thinking that these might prove interesting to my friends in Coos Bay. The Exposition offers, in a musical way, many advantages and I have been greatly benefitted by my stay here.

On June 4th I heard a grand concert in the Civic Auditorium by the Norwegian Choral Union of 800 voices and the Luther College Concert Band. Chorus and band did their things splendidly. However, I could not get my enthusiasm up to any high pitch on this occasion.

The United Swedish singers of the Pacific Coast gave a concert in the same Auditorium on June 16th, assisted by an orchestra under the direction of Axel Pihlstrom. Their soloists were Mme. Sundellus, Mr. Gustav Holmquist and Mr. Joel Mossberg. Mme. Sundellus is an artist of the very highest class; her singing was very fine, especially noticeable was perfect breath control in handling of her voice of great volume and beauty.

The greatest event so far has been the concert last Saturday of the great French composer, Camille Saint-Saens. He conducted in a number of his own compositions, the great Exposition Orchestra, augmented by Sousa's Band. One of the numbers, the Symphonic Episode—"Hall California," composed especially to commemorate the Panama-Pacific Exposition, was very inspiring.

In private circles I have been enjoying several pleasant musical affairs. On the 16th I played at an informal musicale at the studios of Eva and Marie Withrow, widely known here for their activities in musical life. On the same program appeared Mme. Augette Forest, the celebrated Chanson singer of Paris.

All in all, I am enjoying my stay in San Francisco very much. The Exposition is, of course, very fine. All the States are very well represented and the Oregon Building is indeed one of the most attractive of them all, and I am proud in finding the splendid exhibits from Coos Bay there.

A joint recital to be given by Miss Sotie Hammer and myself in Portland has been postponed until fall. I shall return to Marshfield about July 1st, ready to reopen my studios on July 5th.
