

ADD MORE PAVING G. M. BROWN HERE WILL VISIT LODGE

NORTH BEND CITY FATHERS PASS IMPROVEMENT ORDERS

Will Pave Virginia Avenue Between Waterfront and Monroe and Plank Remainder—Other Improvements

Paving of Virginia Avenue from the tracks of the Willamette Pacific to Monroe street and the plank bridge from Monroe to the Pony Slough bridge was formally passed by the North Bend city fathers last evening and thereupon was set in motion another of the many improvements coming this summer to the neighboring city.

Already the grading of the thoroughfare is under way, the contract for this work having been let several weeks ago and it is expected that the entire project will be completed by the coming of the fall rains.

In addition to these improvements McPherson is to have paving 30 feet in width on the two blocks extending to Vermont. The bids for all this paving will be opened by the council at the regular meeting, July 13.

Formally, through an ordinance, the Southern Pacific was granted the 18 months extension for building to North Bend as was unanimously agreed upon at the last meeting.

Further improvement of Sheridan avenue from Washington street to the end of the thoroughfare near the park was discussed by the city fathers but no agreement was reached and the matter will be brought up probably at the next meeting.

C. E. Maybee, city recorder, was granted a two week's leave of absence, commencing after the next meeting, when he and his family expect to take their summer vacation.

ATTORNEY GENERAL HEARS EVIDENCE IN COQUILLE TODAY

If Can Rearrange Business at Salem Will Deliver Fourth of July Oration Here Monday

Action of the Oregon Congressmen in seeking the proper disposal of the Oregon and California Railroad land grant could be better directed through the State Land Board than by the Chambers of Commerce of the state, is the belief of Attorney General George M. Brown, who was here last evening on his way to Coquille. The reason of this, stated Mr. Brown, is that the state bodies are familiar with the land in question, have definite information regarding it and therefore are better prepared in directing the actions of the Congressmen.

"There are few people who know much about this land," declared Mr. Brown, "though there are many who advise what should be done. These state boards have the statistics and are more used to such affairs."

In Coquille today is being heard the case of a man named Smith, of Bandon, who is entitled to damages under the State Industrial Accident Commissions but who claims that he has not been allowed enough by the state.

Mr. Brown knew very little of the facts last evening, other than that Smith seeks \$25 a month for a period of 30 months. The evidence will be taken before Judge Coke, with the attorney general handling it for the state. The findings will then be sent in to Salem to the state commission.

This is not the first case of this commission, stated Mr. Brown, though they have been rare. One is now being appealed from Polk county.

Would Speak Here

Strenuous efforts have been made to persuade the attorney general to stop over here until Monday that he may give the Fourth of July address. His acceptance will be based on a telegram to be sent to Salem today where he will try to have some matters delayed until next week. At the present time Mr. Brown is busy in getting ready to meet a heavy damage case, he said, that is coming before the state commission.

There were many of Mr. Brown's old friends at the Chandler last night to greet him. He had time to chat with them all and said that he would like nothing better than to stay here three or four days and get acquainted again.
