RICKREALL.—The State Veterinarian has just finished testing for tuberculosis all of the dairy herds in Polk County.

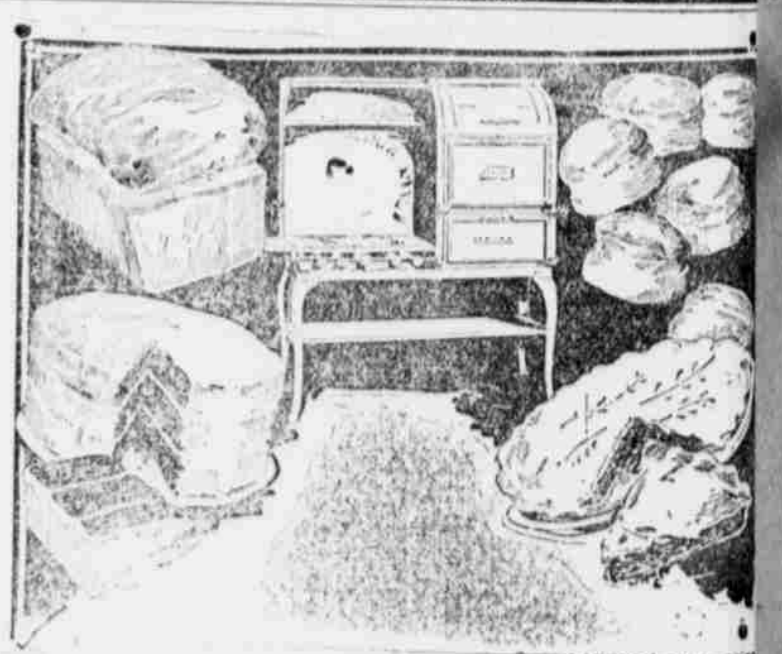
