

MAY AID CONGRESS BASEBALL SCORES LANDS ARE AT STAKE SAYS WAS KICKED

RECOMMENDATIONS OF LOCAL CHAMBER FAVOR

800 Other Commercial Bodies of U. S. Would Establish Federal Shipping Board

Five questions submitted to the local Chamber of Commerce by the national Chamber regarding the creation of a federal shipping board for the stimulation of American shipping and voted on favorable here a short time ago were also passed by a large majority in more than 800 other commercial bodies of the United States.

Four other questions about the government ownership of merchant vessels and their substitution were not voted on by the local chamber and were voted down by the other Chambers of Commerce in the United States.

All States Voted

The survey extended to every state in the Union. The recommendations will be placed before Congress when it next convenes. It is expected that this universal expression of opinion will go far in the adoption of the methods called for.

The first recommendation was for the creation of a federal shipping board to investigate and report to Congress regarding the navigation laws and to have full jurisdiction, under the law, in all matters pertaining to over-sea transportation.

The second was that the government subscribe to the entire stock of a marine development company, with a capital of \$25,000,000. Under the supervision of the above named board money could be loaned for seven years for the building of new ships, taking the vessels as securities and also taking as evidence of this indebtedness bonds which bear a fair rate of interest, the development company to guarantee the bonds as to principal and interest and sell them to the public.

Cut Down Speed

To permit lines to carry freight as well as mail it is recommended that the speed of boats in the mail service be reduced on a graduated basis.

Also it was recommended that federal business should be taken out by lines, domestic and foreign, engaged in shipping between ports of the United States and other countries.

BALL TEAMS ARE FORMING IN GROUPS

NEW YORK, July 8.—With the halfway mark of the baseball season close at hand, the clubs in the American and National leagues are gathering into well defined groups for the drive to the finish.

At present four clubs in the National league have an excellent chance for the flag, while in the American league three teams are in line for the honors. In the National, Chicago, Philadelphia, St. Louis and Pittsburgh clubs are closely bunched. Separated sharply from the first group comes Brooklyn, Boston, New York, and Cincinnati also closely bunched.

Chicago Slipping—Chicago has been slipping of late, while Philadelphia has been gaining and St. Louis and Pittsburgh about holding their own. In the second division the long-hoped for brace of the Boston has not been in evidence.

The Brooklyn at present are making the strongest threat to redeem past misdeeds and move out of the second division. The American league race finds the Chicago team far out in front, but with the chances of Boston and Detroit by no means hopeless. The pace set by the White Sox, however is a dizzy one, and the second and third place teams until the past week have not been able to keep up with it.

In general the Chicagoans are playing a game not to be matched at present in either league. Have Sharp Fight—New York and Washington form the second American league group.

JOHN FOULKES SEES HENRY SENGSTACKEN AND OTHERS

Alleges Title Lands Said to be Worth Over \$12,000 Were Bought From Insane Woman

Title to tide lands said to be worth more than \$12,000 is being fought out today before Judge John S. Coke. The case is John Foulkes, heir of Elizabeth Williams, deceased, versus Henry Sengstacken and others, with Staff and Hojze for the plaintiff and Peck and Peck for the defendants.

Several months ago testimony was taken in the case, many witnesses being examined at that time, and on the argument is being made.

It is claimed by the plaintiff that Elizabeth Williams, who is said to have sold the land and to have passed title, was incompetent because of insanity and therefore they seek to have the transaction set aside. The land is said to be situated opposite Pony Slough and it is said that some time ago half of it was sold for approximately \$4,500.

It is expected that no immediate decision will be rendered in the case and that some will be forthcoming until both sides have submitted briefs for consideration by Judge Coke.

SKIPPER WELL KNOWN

Captain Sorenson Was Captain of Aryan That Saved German Crew

With the arrival in Seattle a few days ago of Captain Peter Sorenson of the American ship Genl. F. Hunt, there is recalled on this coast a trip of a few years ago when this skipper, commanding the American clipper ship Aryan, since lost off the Horn, brought into San Francisco harbor 11 members of the crew of the German ship Agnes after she had foundered in the southern seas. These sailors were the crew of one of three lifeboats, the other two small craft never being heard from.

Storm tossed on the Horn, coming from Montevideo to San Francisco, one afternoon in March of 1898, a sailor in the mizen rigging of the Aryan sighted a small boat to leeward. Already stripped to bare poles, buffeted by a heavy sea and head wind, the Aryan wallowed and waited.

Two hours later the smart life boat with a small sail beat up within sight from leeward and after several hours of difficult maneuvering in a storm of hail and snow, reached a line from the Aryan and one by one were drawn aboard, almost frozen and starved to death. They had been adrift for nearly a week. Captain Behrens, of the German ship, told a tale of horror, how 150 days out of Cardiff with a cargo of coal his steel ship took fire and the hatches exploded, sending all the men scurrying into the three little boats 150 miles south of Cape Horn almost in midwinter. They were brought into San Francisco, bad with scurvy, but thankful to be alive.
