GERMAN AMERICANS ARE TRUE AMERICANS

THE German-American citizens of this country are loyal; never was there any doubt of this in the minds of the vast majority of the American people. Herman Ridder, the distinguished editor of the New York Staats Zeitung, voiced the sentiment of all when he said:

"The German-Americans must suffer in any conflict between the United States and Germany pains of which their fellow citizens can never know anything. They have fought to uphold the flag in the past and they will do so again against any enemy whatsoever. They deserve the fruits of past loyalty until they have forfeited the right to claim them. There has never been but one flag under which the German-American has fought. There will never be but one flag under which he will ever fight, and that flag is the Stars and Stripes.

The same sentiment is voiced by A. G. Koehle, president of the United German Societies of New York, and it will be taken up and reiterated by every leader among them, and no American will doubt their sincerity and good faith. If events lead up to war—and every true man and woman this side of the ocean hopes and believes the situation is not so serious as to make such an outcome possible—these Americans who come from the Fatherland across one ocean will be trusted in public places and respected in private life just as fully as they have ever been in the past. They have played an important part in the making of this great nation and millions of our citizens have German blood in their veins and are proud of it. The American people have no quarrel with the German people, and if feeling exists in this country it is directed against the military powers of the German empire and not against the German people, either here or across the ocean.

It does not seem possible that the long friendship existing between the United States and Germany must be so rudely broken that only the shedding of blood will suffice to settle the differences. And yet in these perilous times, when all the better attributes of civilization are seemingly set at naught, who knows what the trend of events may lead up to? The president of the nation has spoken, and there is no longer any difference of opinion of those matters which but a few days ago were subjects of public discussion and debate. That is all past, all are today of one mind, says an exchange. Patriotism may be blind and unreasoning; some there are who contend that but for Europe never would have been plunged into the awful vortex of war; that it was because the people followed their rulers as one man, making them strong and arrogant. But there is no use to argue this question—we see the strength of patriotic fervor all over the land, subscribing to but one pledge—that of the gallant DeWitt: "My country, may she always be right; but, right or wrong,—my country!"

Millions of our bravest, most loyal citizens are praying for peace, but if providence decrees otherwise a hundred million Americans will hold up the hands of an American president, and the stars and stripes will be only more a sacred emblem to lead a people wherever destiny may call.

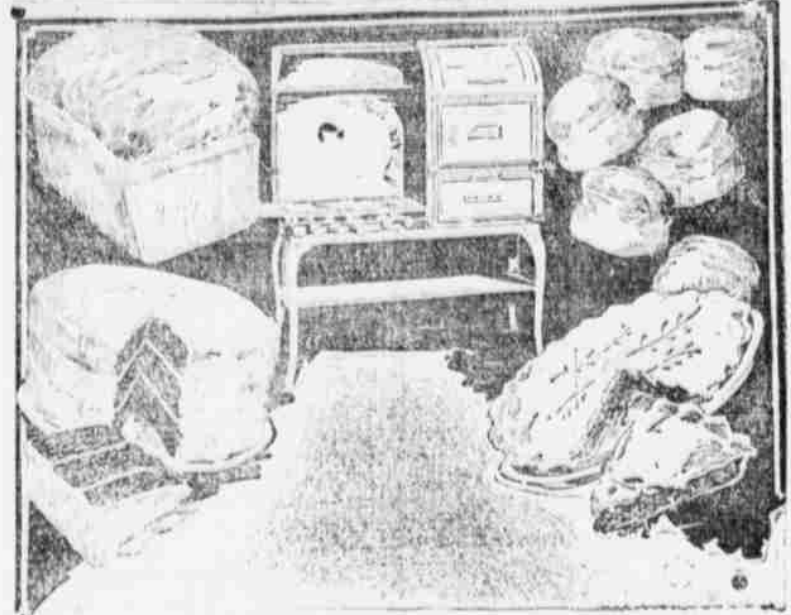

Lawn and Garden Sprinkling

Everyone who expects to use water for lawn or garden sprinkling is required to sign an application and make payment before using any water for this purpose. The rate fixed by the Railroad Commission for sprinkling is \$1.00 per month for each 5000 square feet (50 by 100-foot lot, or less, building space included. Payment of four months, or \$4.00 in advance allows use for one year in advance for lawn sprinkling, washing windows, porches, etc., but if paid by the month use is only allowed during the month paid.

The rules filed with the Railroad Commission require that payment be made in advance each month before using same and that sprinkling be done only between 6 and 8 o'clock, morning and evening. No reduction in rates will be allowed in case water is not required for sprinkling every day of the month. If water is used for sprinkling without payment having been made in advance or outside of sprinkling hours, the service may be entirely shut off and not turned on until \$1.00 penalty has been paid.
