WILL GET MAIL SERVICE

Route From Gold Beach to Harbor Will be Re-established

(Special to The Times.) GOLD BEACH, Ore., July 12.—The people of Gold Beach and those who live south of here in Curry County are exceedingly glad to know that the route from Gold Beach to Harbor, over which mail was formerly carried, is to be re-established.

Last year when bids were received, the department declared that they were all too high and cut off the route. It has made great inconvenience. The new milling town of Brookings is opposite Harbor and in order to send a letter from that place to the county seat it had to go down to Crescent City, California, across the mountains Pacific and around that way to Gold Beach, although the distance between Gold Beach on the north and Harbor and Brookings on the south was only 44 miles.

The bidding for the route is to close July 27 and the route will be established August 16 to continue under the contract until June 30, 1918.
