FORD OWNERS GET \$15,000,000 DETROIT, July 19.—The Ford Automobile company announced today a refund of approximately \$15,000,000 to the owners of Ford automobiles who have purchased their machines since August 1, 1914. On August 1, 1914, the company announced that if 300,000 automobiles were sold during the ensuing year each purchaser would receive a refund of from \$40 to \$60. The 300,000 mark was reached last week. The company says the refund is strictly in the nature of the profit distribution policy of the company. Can Get Licenses—Persons desiring to catch crabs and dig crabs may now get them direct from the Justice of the Peace, the necessary papers having been received this morning from Judge Pennock from Master State Fish Warden H. L. Kelly. Several persons have paid their money, securing only receipts. The Justice says they should at once get the necessary license. No license, according to Mr. Kelly, is required to sell crabs or crabs.
