VICTIM OF RUNAWAY YESTERDAY TO BE BURIED AT NORWAY Mother Wives From Idaho She is Coming—Deceased Leaves Young Wife and Baby Word was received today from Mrs. Melton, mother of Archie Melton who was killed in North Bend late yesterday afternoon, that she will arrive here in time for the funeral. It is possible that it will be held Saturday afternoon and interment will be in the Norway cemetery. After the team started, near the bridge on Porter Heights, Melton fell out and became entangled in the harness, being dragged about 100 feet. His skull was badly fractured, the shoulder and several ribs were broken besides several other scalp wounds. Little is known as to how the accident happened. After the frightened horses crossed the bridge they continued their wild flight as far as the Porter mill. The deceased leaves a wife and little baby. Mrs. Melton is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Hemingway, with whom she is now staying.
