Begins Suit Today. — Suit was filed in the Justice Court today by the Finnish Co-operative society against W. F. Manning and Amelia Manning for the collection of \$40.80, said to have been due January 30, 1914, together with six per cent interest.

Will Build Home. — C. K. Perry is closing negotiations with L. J. Post for the erection of a fine \$2,500 home modern in every way, in Perham Park on Eighth street, just north of Commercial and near the R. A. Copple home. Work on it is to be started about August 1.

Naval Inspector. — W. E. Sharon of the machinist department of the U. S. Navy who is here to claim Miss Minnie Harkensee as a bride, has been assigned as inspector for the rebuilding of the U. S. S. Bushnell at

the Bremerton Navy Yards at Puget Sound. He is to take up his new duties there August 17.

Plans Trip. — F. C. Birch and wife and wife expect to leave about July 27 for San Francisco where Mr. Birch will take some post graduate work in optometry. Funeral on Saturday. — The funeral of Archie Melton who was killed in a runaway at North Bend on Tuesday afternoon will be held Saturday at 12:30 p. m. in the Dungan Undertaking parlors. On the afternoon train the body will be taken to Norway for burial. It is expected that either the mother, Mrs. Melton, or her eldest son will be here from Idaho for the funeral.

No Ferry Contract Let. — Judge Watson stated this morning that the county commissioners have not yet let the contract for the night ferry service between Marshfield and Eastside. He said the lowest bid was \$60 and the commissioners are now investigating the equipment that would be used. This is \$40 a month under the price now being paid for the service. He said the contract would probably be let within a week.

Now Comes "Blue Book." — But a few days ago the Austrians published their "Red Book" containing accounts of the cruelties of the Allied soldiers. Now comes the "Blue Book," containing vice versa charges, published by the English, and the preface states that the Right Honorable Viscount Bryce had charge of the examinations of witnesses. A copy of the book has been sent to the Chamber of Commerce where any one may read it.

New Flag Floats. — The members of the fire department and the city officials are religiously guarding a big new flag that has been received and which on special occasions will fly from the top of the city hall. This comes to replace the old and tattered ensign that whipped in the wind, doing duty until torn to shreds. It is possible that a new pole will have to be raised, because the flag is so large and the strain, it is feared, would break the present stick during a heavy wind.
