Hot Weather.—Dr. Wm. Horsfall received a card today from C. E. Nicholson who left with F. G. Horton and A. T. Haines in an auto for Klamath Falls. He said it was 98 in the shade at Grants Pass. At Portland, other reports state, it was 102 in the shade Tuesday—the hottest it has been in years.

Begins Suit.—Sheriff Johnson was here yesterday serving papers in the case of Agnes Peters, executrix of Anna Eva Wulff estate vs. Sarah A. Farrin, Joise McKay, A. H. McKay, and I. S. Kaufman. The action is to foreclose a \$500 mortgage on property held by the defendants.

To Picnic at Beach.—The Bible class of the Christian church of which Judge Schlabre is head, expects to leave this evening on a special boat for Charleston Bay or the Government work in the lower Bay for a bonfire supper and social time. It is expected that 20 members will go, leaving here about 6:30 this evening.

Hearing Postponed.—The hearing in the Charles Sneddon case was postponed late yesterday afternoon until Monday morning because Court Reporter A. B. Loud was called to Coquille for the equity term. Charles Sneddon is seeking the removal of his three guardians and his attorneys say that he wants a new guardian appointed later.

Adds a Planer.—Otto Muetzel of Lakeside has closed a deal for the purchase of a planer from the Simpson Lumber company and will install it in his mill at Lakeside. He has a contract for over a million feet of bridge timber for the Southern Pacific. His local orders are increasing also and the mill is turning out about 20,000 feet a day.

Surveys Road.—P. M. Hall-Lewis, county roadmaster, same over from Coquille today to reset the stakes on the county road near Millington, where some hard paving is to be put in. He set the stakes once and someone pulled them up. Contractors who are figuring on the work wanted the stakes set again so that they could figure more accurately.

Word from the county assessor this morning stated there are 9,386 cows in Coos. At once the figures were changed on the big map made by Roy Lawhorne. The map will be sent on Monday to San Francisco.
