## CASHED BAD CHECK COMING WITH BRIDE

C. W. McARTHUR, OR MURGO-TROYD, SERIOUSLY CHARGED

Claimed Passed Bogus Paper on Peter Mirrasoul July 4th Caught At Powers—Was Jailed

Charged with passing worthless checks C. W. MacArthur or, as his name is believed to be, Murgotroyd, has been arrested at Powers and is now in jail at Coquille. It was about July 4 that the man is said to have cashed two checks with Peter Mirrasoul and that one was for about \$10 and the other approximately \$20.

His capture comes now at the end of a still hunt that has been waged in all parts of the county. Informed soon after the checks were received back from the bank, the Sheriff and his deputies took up the search.

It was heard that McArthur was above Allegany in the woods. Deputy Sheriff Laird and Peter Mirrasoul went up. McArthur was gone and they came back empty-handed to bide their time.

On Monday reports came from Powers that the man was living there with his family. There being no machines out of Coquille at the time Sheriff Johnson phoned to Constable James Brown at Myrtle Point. He hurried into Powers and made the arrest.

Still Another "Artist."

And since the advent and the disappearance of McArthur there has been another man in the field with a no-fund check. Charles Baxter, at the Eagle Bar, yesterday told Constable Cox that a man named Ed. Stevens had passed a \$15 check in there and that it had come back to them. Only \$5, he said, was paid on the check when it was cashed. It had been made out, said Baxter, to Sam Gordon and was drawn on a Myrtle Point bank and then had been in turn endorsed over to Ed Stevens.

No complaint has been made out in the latter case, and it is said that Stevens left soon after on the Coquille stage.
