Makes Incorporated Towns Separate Road Districts

NEW LAW WHICH WILL GO INTO EFFECT THE FIRST OF THE YEAR WILL MAKE EVERY INCORPORATED TOWN IN OREGON A ROAD DISTRICT IN ITSELF AND COUNTY CLERK MUST MAKE NEW BOUNDARIES

Beginning with next year every incorporated town and city in the state of Oregon will become a separate road district and the general road levy made by the county court each year will not apply to these incorporated towns for the reason that they have a road and street fund of their own.

Heretofore the towns have been compelled to pay the road tax which is used for the improvement of the highways in the outside districts, at the same time the citizens paying their city road and street tax. The smaller cities have been endeavoring to have the law in this regard changed and they were successful in putting it through the last legislature.

The law says that the County Court at the October term of 1915 shall make the changes in boundaries of the road districts to conform to this amendment of the law. In building bridges of any considerable size in the county hereafter, they will have to be built from the general fund of the county in order to make assessments therefor. Nearly all the towns are incorporated, and under this new law they will be exempt from the general road tax levy.
