### FINES FALLING OFF TO REMOVE SNAGS

POLICE COURT RECEIPTS FAR BELOW LAST YEAR  
Total Since January 1, \$482, While Over \$2,000 Was Collected Last Year

City Recorder Butler reports a big slump in the fines in police court cases this year in comparison with a year ago. With the city's finances falling off from the loss of some saloon licenses and other causes, the additional slump in fines is adding to the official gloom.

So far since January 1, the fines collected total only \$482. Last year, the receipts in police court totalled considerably over \$2,000.

Mr. Butler says that speeding cases and other penalties added to the income last year and many more imbibers contributed to the city's income than this year.

### DREDGE OREGON TO COMPLETE SOUTH COOS RIVER WORK

Engineer Polhemus Orders Sunken Logs Removed From Channel—Obstructions Pointed Out

The dredge Oregon, belonging to the Larson Dredging company, was sent back up South Coos River this morning to complete the work of clearing the channel. The Oregon did part of the work a few weeks ago but returned leaving a number of sunken logs and snags which were a menace to navigation.

Capt. E. George Smith reported the matter to Engineer Polhemus in charge of the government work here and immediately Mr. Polhemus instructed the Larson company to complete the work. He requested Capt. Smith to designate the points where the snags and logs were bothering and where work was needed to put the channel in first class shape.

The Rainbow is now on the ways being repaired as a result of colliding with one of the snags the other day.

### ASHES FIRE SCARE HOLD CHECK ARTIST

JANITOR IN MATLOCK BLOCK PILES ASHES ON WOOD

But Little Damage Done in Basement of Former Sacchi Building in Scare Last Evening

As a result of hot ashes being thrown on top of slab wood used to fire the furnace in the basement of the Matlock building, formerly known as the Sacchi building, at the corner of Second and Commercial, the Marshfield Fire Department was called out last evening.

The fire had not gained much headway when it was discovered and a general alarm was not turned in. Duncan Ferguson responded promptly with the auto fire truck and the chemical soon extinguished the blaze so that only the smoke from the smoldering fire was noticeable.

Messrs. Blivens, Lattin and Rhodes said that there were about two loads of ashes piled on top of the slab wood in the basement and some of the over heated ashes had caused the scare. The damage was insignificant.

J. Albert Matson, who with Herbert Lockhart is the principal owner of the property, arranged to have a watchmen placed there so that there would be no further danger.

### JANITOR IS ACCUSED

MARSHAL SAYS GORR DUMPED ASHES WRONGFULLY GIVEN A CHANCE

After hearing the case this afternoon City Recorder Butler fined the defendant \$5 but suspended payment on condition that the ashes be removed, that a metal receptacle be provided and on some other conditions. It was held by the judge that the defendant and only recently acquired the position as janitor and that the ashes causing the fire were likely placed there by someone else.

Marshal J. W. Carter today swore out a warrant for Burt Gorr, janitor of the Matlock building, at Second and Commercial, charging him with violating a city ordinance prohibiting the dumping of ashes except into a fire-proof receptacle. The warrant was issued by Recorder Butler, and Gorr, who is a young man, will have his hearing later.

Fire Chief Keating wanted charges also preferred against the owners of the property and have the ordinance prohibiting the promiscuous dumping of ashes tested out.

Jerry Kinney accidentally discovered the fire last night and informed Walter Richardson, who called the firemen over. Had the fire broken out later, firemen say it would have been hard to curb on account of the large amount of dry slab wood stored in the basement.

W. McARTHUR OR MURGATOYD BOUND OVER TODAY

Claims Someone Cashed Forged Check on His Reno Account \$500 Bond Needed

COQUILLE, Ore., July 30.—Chas. W. McArthur, who also goes under the name of Murgatoyd, was bound over to the grand jury by Justice Stanley this morning on the charge of passing two worthless checks on Peter Mirrasoul at Marshfield about July 4. His bail was fixed at \$500 which he has been unable to furnish. McArthur was arrested at Powers where he formerly worked in one of the camps.

When arraigned today, he claimed that someone had forged a \$212 check on his account at the First National Bank at Reno, Nev., and this caused his checks, which Mirrasoul cashed, to be returned. The two Mirrasoul checks were for \$10 and \$20.

McArthur when asked about changing his name to Murgatoyd said that he had assumed the name of McArthur when working up north where he had been injured. He gave no reason "except that any one having as much trouble as he had was justified in changing his name.

The Reno bank's statement showed that McArthur's account had been closed July 14. McArthur was in Marshfield at the time. He exhibited the \$212 check which he claimed was forged but it looked like his writing.

### PROWLER ESCAPES

STRANGER NEAR JUDGE COKE'S HOME LAST NIGHT

About 11 o'clock last night, Mrs. Robert Marsden, Jr., who had just returned home from the Noble theatre noticed a man trying to gain entrance to the home of Judge J. S. Coke. She called to him and he made some excuse about trying to find his home and made a hasty exit.

Mrs. Coke and other members of the family heard the prowler about the time that Mrs. Marsden noticed him. Senator James Coke who is a guest at the Judge Coke home came out but the stranger had disappeared. Judge Coke was at his office at the time.

Mrs. Marsden was unable to give any description of the stranger today.

Marshal Carter and Officer Richardson believe that the prowler was probably a stranger under the influence of liquor who had lost his way. Several such cases have been reported during the last few weeks.

About a week ago, a prowler molested the Coke home in a similar manner.

### SPEED BOAT STRIKES HIDDEN SNAG IN RIVER

Atlantic Has Propeller Shaft Buckled in Impact With Sunken Log on Coos River

On her way down Coos river yesterday morning near its mouth the speed boat Atlantic ran into a sunken log and the propeller shaft was buckled in the middle. It was necessary to put the vessel on the ways to make the repairs.

At the time of the accident the Atlantic was bringing down the "summer commuters" from South Coos River. She was delayed on the trip upriver yesterday afternoon on this account.

It is believed that a waterlogged log, drifting down stream, was the cause of the accident. This is the second time in the last two months that the Atlantic has struck hidden snags, the first time being far up South Coos River.

### CLEARING AWAY LUMBER

Steamer Fifield is Still Making Run To Brookings

The steamer Fifield still makes the run from Brookings to San Francisco. The big mill in Curry County closed down on account of the poor lumber market, but there is quite a lot of lumber on hand at the mill and the Fifield will continue to carry it away. The steamer is owned by the Estabrook Company and was chartered for a stated length of time by the Brookings Company. The company also operates the steamers Bandon and Speedwell.

### NO SITE BOUGHT

Place for Wireless Station is Not Yet Secured

Nothing definite has been done regarding the selection of a wireless site for the government station. Henry Sengstacken said today he would wire others who are interested with him in land up near Millington trying to get them to dispose of five acres at \$100 an acre. He said they wanted \$175 an acre. John Motley has written E. H. Dobb, superintendent of radio on the Pacific Coast saying that a site will be bought as soon as one can be found.
